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## A COGKNEY RHINOCEROS

FO THE EDITOR OF THE TIIES.
Sir, -Not long ago it was my privilege to announce tho birth of a baby hippopotamus at the Zoolomical Gardens. "It never rains but it poure," and it is thereforo with great pleasure I beg to inform the public through your columns that a joung rhinoceros (R. Sumatrensis) bas been born at the Victoria Docks. Tho little besst, with its mother, is cow at No. 1, King's-place, Commercial-road, sud is the properts of Messrs, C. W. Rice, 1. H. Jamrach, jon., and C. Eragenbeck. It is about three feet long and two feat high. It has * ridicalous-looking innocents hairless face, not unlike that of a eswly-born mouse; it carries its cars folded bsekwards like bare, and ita body is covered with bluck hoir ; while it has a little horm as bis ssa ahilling on its nosa. It had a narrow squeak for its life. It escaped from the cage soon aftor it was born, and Fandered about the ship's deck, getting quite wet and cold. It was, howorer, reacued and sifr. Bartlett called into conzulfation. By his advice it was carefally praped ap in blankets and meyed to Mr. Rice's house. On arrival, Mrs. Bice norsed it before a warm fire till its mother arrived in her caye. Dir. Bartlett adrised that no con's milk ahould be given. After a time, whea tho mothor arrived in a van, sho was milked like 2 cow and the milk given to tho young i one, and the little wretch got a lively that Mrs. Bice coald not hold him; so they pat him with his mother at once, and the pair ever sinco havo been doing inmously in a dark, warm corner at Sir. Rice's esta-!
 blishment. Tho littlo one has a box to himself aud a feather bed to sleep on. "Jack," Dir. Rico's head keoper, sleeps in the box with tbo young rhinoceros, and takes caro that it is warm and comfortable. The motber-3 great beast sboat LOft. losg and abont 4ft. Gin. high-has been hitherto very quict, but now she is getting a littlo asage, oven though 5he has a nice warm horse rig tied over her, and has tho best of food. Tho little animal secms quite strong and ective, and walls abont by himself, going into his box or Iring down by his mother when he has had his divoer. I havo tasted the milk of the rhinoceros. It is axeclleat. I suppoce I am about the only man who has tasted rhinocoros milk and eaten a steak of soung hippopotamas in Yondon. We mutiolookout for now articles of diet in theso hard times.

I shonla be very sorry if this young rhinoceros and its: motber were allowed to cross the Atlantic, and I trast sin-. cerely that the Council of tho Zoological Sociery will see fit to purchse theso two interesting and valuable animals. Verj great credit must be given to 3 lr. Eogeleke, who has been 15 times to India to bring backliving animals, and to MIr. Rice and Mr. Jamrach for the capital they bave embarkod and the courare thes have abown in the captare and shipment of "t widd ieasts" for the instruction and amusement of the pabiic. At the next meeting of the Zooloyical Societs, December 17, at Hznorer-squere, SLr. Bartlett inill gire further particalars of this joung rhinoseros, tho inst, and I beliere tho only onc, orer born in Enaland.
