**NEW RHINOCEROS AT THE ZOO.**

**A GIFT FROM NEPAL.**

The Indian rhinoceros presented to the Zoological Society of London by the Maharajah of Nepal arrived at the Gardens on Saturday, and was on view in the Elephant House in the afternoon. The British India s.s. Merkara, which brought it from Calcutta, was able to berth at Gravesend before midday, and, thanks to the promptness of the docks and Customs officials, the animal was quickly transferred to a motor-lorry, and reached the Gardens early in the afternoon.

The rhinoceros is a male less than half-grown, but plump and very active. It began to feed heartily as soon as it entered its stall, and before closing time had already learned to look to visitors for tributes of buns. It appears to have taken no harm from its four days' experience of Thames fogs. The Zoo has now three rhinoceroses—one from Africa, purchased from Tanganyika Territory two years ago; a young female, presented by the Prince of Wales on his return from his last trip to India; and the new arrival. There is thus a young pair of the Indian species, and the attempt will be made to bring them together next spring to induce them to become companions before they are of an age to pair. There is no record of rhinoceroses having bred in the London Zoo, and instances from elsewhere are few and extremely doubtful. Whether or no this is an instance of the sterility which often affects animals in captivity is uncertain. The total number that have been in Zoological Gardens is not great, and it can seldom have happened that a pair of suitable age were together in one institution.

**PLYMOUTH AS "PORT OF LONDON."**

**M.P.'S REASON FOR SILENCE.**

At the annual dinner of the Three Towns' Association (Plymouthians in London) at the Hotel Cecil on Saturday, under the chairmanship of Mr. J. A. HAWKE, M.P., Recorder of Plymouth, the MAYOR OF PLYMOUTH (Mr. R. W. Winnicott), referring to the fact that passengers and mails were brought from liners at Plymouth to London in four hours, said the town was becoming known as the port of London. (Laughter.) He mentioned that Prince Henry had promised to open a fête in aid of the local hospitals on June 24.

MAJOR L. HORE-BELISHA, M.P., said that one day Lady Astor would have the only qualification that would ensure the hanging of her picture—death. (Laughter.) He mentioned that he had asked Mr. Hawke why it was that, although he had been a member of the Oxford Union, he had never spoken in the House of Commons. Mr. Hawke replied that the speeches at the Oxford Union were so sublime that he was entranced by listening, and that the speeches in the House of Commons were so deplorable that he could not remain to listen to them. (Laughter.)

Mr. HAWKE referred to the unique position that Plymouth held in the annals of law. It frequently occurred, he said, that as Recorder of that town, with a population of over two hundred thousand, he had no prisoners to try. Although the dinner was being held in London he really felt that they were in Plymouth, and he would remind them that, being in Plymouth, he, as a judicial officer, could say nothing of politics.

**GUILD OF SINGERS AND PLAYERS.**

submitted by the Brentford Council, which provided that the control and finance of the Brentford Market should be in the hands of the Brentford representatives of the local authority of the combined districts, and that the losses, if any, should be borne by Brentford alone, and the profits credited to Brentford. No agreement was reached, however, and the matter has been in abeyance for some time.

In the meantime the question of the amalgamation of Brentford with Chiswick has arisen, and recently negotiations have taken place between the district councils of Chiswick and Brentford. The Brentford authority, however, before coming to any decision, resolved again to approach the Ealing Council with the object of reopening negotiations for amalgamation with Ealing on the terms already mentioned. It may be recalled that Ealing is making application to the Ministry of Health for a provisional order to extend its boundaries so as to include the urban districts of Hanwell and Greenford.

The Ealing Town Council have had before them the request of the Brentford Council and have stated that they are prepared to meet representatives of the Brentford district, but, as a preliminary to the discussion of amalgamation, they point out that it must be understood, in the event of Brentford being incorporated with Ealing and the urban districts of Hanwell and Greenford, the Brentford Market must be controlled by the local authority of the enlarged borough, and that if the profits from the market are to be reserved in any way they can only be earmarked for the purpose of widening Brentford High-street, one of the narrowest and most congested of the important thoroughfares of Greater London. The Ealing Council also stipulate that when the widening of High-street is completed and paid for, the profits of the market must be credited to the borough fund.

The extension of Ealing's boundaries to include the three urban districts of Brentford, Hanwell, and Greenford would be an important step towards the reduction of the number of local authorities surrounding London, as recommended by the Royal Commission which inquired into the government of Greater London.
