

# **Zoo News**

We start this year's Zoo News section with an exciting 'British first' from Whipsnade Park - the birth of the first white rhinoceros ever conceived in captivity in Britain. The young male white rhino was born on 21 January, after a gestation period of 16% months. The mother is seven years old and came to Whipsnade with 19 other rhinos in 1970, from the Umfolozi and Hluhluwe Game Reserve in South Africa. The Whipsnade herd now numbers 24 - it includes two rhinos which were already

in the Park, and one born in the Umfolozi herd which had been conceived in the wild.

Attractions at London Zoo this Easter include the male polar bear cub born last November; the fourth polar bear to be born and reared at the zoo. The young female black rhino, born last November, is also popular with visitors; she is the second black rhino to be born at London

A new exhibit at Marwell Zoological Park is for European bison. An area of woodland has been partly cleared, and the first pair of European bison arrived at the end of December after having completed a year's quarantine. They

originated from the Bialowieza Forest in Poland, where the species has been re-established in the wild.

A pair of African hunting dogs (which had been born at Whipsnade) have produced pups at Marwell - under somewhat unusual circumstances. The bitch experienced a very difficult, unsuccessful labour, and on examination it was found that the first pup was lying in a transverse position, preventing a natural birth. A Caesarian section was performed, which was successful - nine pups were removed, of which six were alive. Attempts were then made to get the mother to accept two of her offspring by coating the pups with afterbirth to conceal the smell of humans. But unfortunately the bitch ignored her pups, and after only two hours one had died. The other pup was returned to its brothers and sisters which were being bottle-fed. All the pups were very delicate, however, and two more died. An appeal was put out quickly for a foster-mother, and the response was enormous. A mongrel bitch which had ै। all but one of its recent litter was chosen. The three remaining hunting dog pups, now in a very weakened state, were introduced to the tolerant bitch. Within twelve hours there was a dramatic improvement in the condition of the pups, and they fed normally. At six weeks they were weaned, and are continuing to grow rapidly. It is hoped that they will soon be introduced to the adult hunting dogs.

Philip Wayre, owner of the Norfolk Wildlife Park at Great Witchingham, has launched The Otter Trust, which aims to promote the conservation of otters all over the world. Many naturalists have given their backing to the Trust, which hopes to recruit 2,000 members. Mr. Wayre is the Trust's honorary director, and he has opened temporary offices for the Trust at Great Witchingham. He hopes to be able to establish the Trust Raydon, near Hadleigh, in Suffolk, re a 60-acre site has been purchased. The site includes a valley with a stream, a small lake, marshes, and open parkland. The Otter Trust aims to promote and support field research on otters, and to breed otters in captivity. On 27 December a common otter was born in the Norfolk Wildlife Park, the fifth breeding in captivity in Britain this century - all of which have been at Great Witchingham.

For the first time in Europe, bongo antelopes have been bred at Frankfurt Zoo in Germany. A young female, born on 21 January, is only the fourth to have been born in a zoo. The three adult bongos at Frankfurt arrived from Kenya in 1970. Bongos are among the most beautiful, and elusive, species of antelope. They have reddish-brown fur and white stripes, and the young calf is already as colourful as its parents.
