THE vast and comprehensive menagerie of the Ringling Bros and Barnum & Bailey Combined Circus, with its giraffes, its rhinoceroses, its hippopotami and hundreds of rare wild animals not seen outside of one or two of the world's leading zoos, is acclaimed by animal experts of all lands as the finest in existence.

It is true that there is nothing so terrible as the charge of a rhinoceros, but Mary is very gentle—that is, up to date. Billy has never shown viciousness, except when men cleaning his cage have disturbed him, and then he has been left instantly alone. But most of the time he recognizes his friends. He and Mary are features of the very highest rank, as no other circus



in the world has even one rhinoceros.

There seems no end of the wild animals in the Ringling Bros and Barnum & Bailey zoo—lions, tigers, jaguars, leopards, black leopards, pumas, polar bears, brown bears, African porcupines, hartbeests, gnus, black bok, sea lions, Indian buffalo, audads, orangutans, baboons, chimpanzees, a hundred species of monkeys, every variety of African antelope and other African cloven-hoof animals, including pygmy and other deer, anteaters, king vultures, cranes, penguins and so on, cage after cage, den after den.

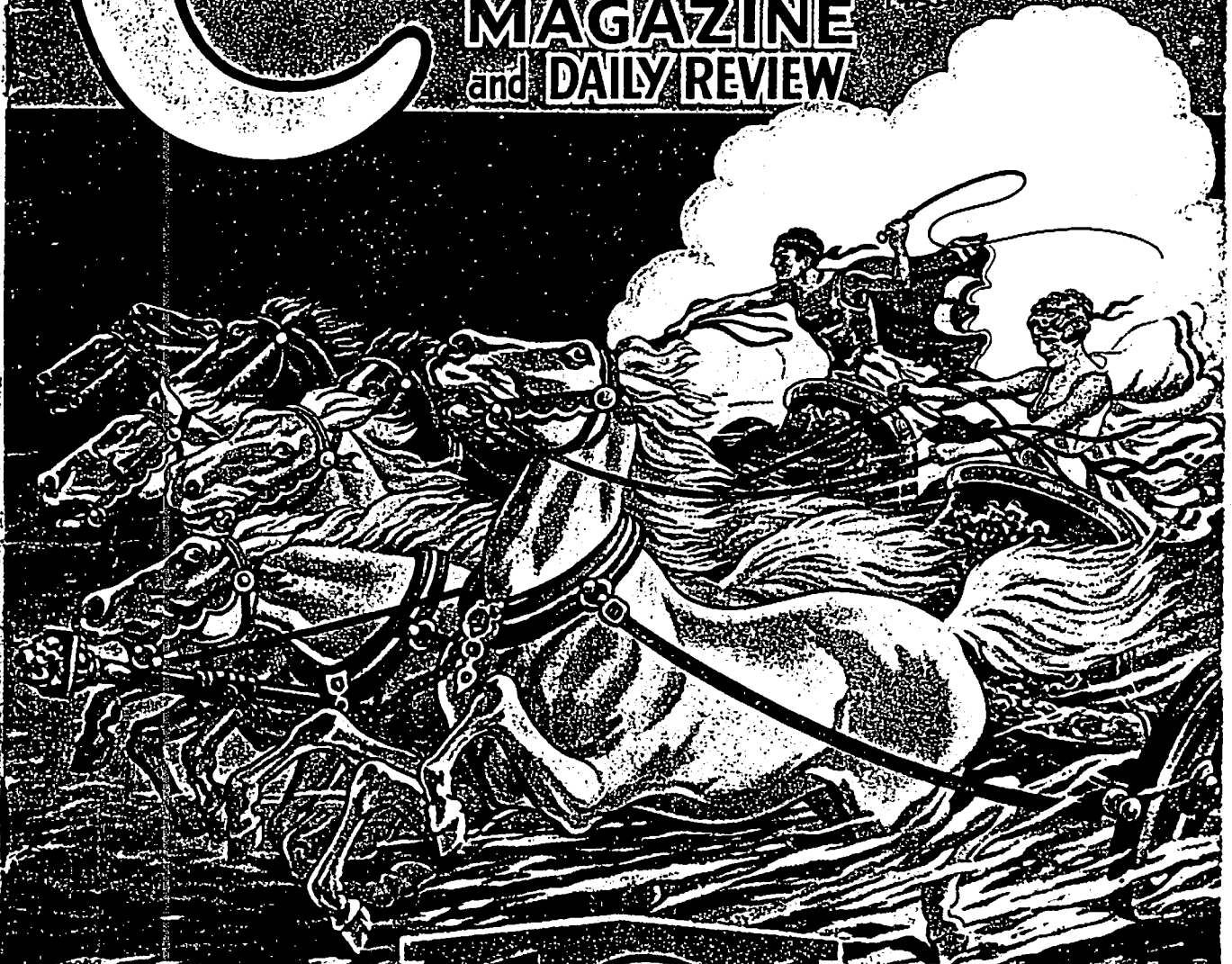
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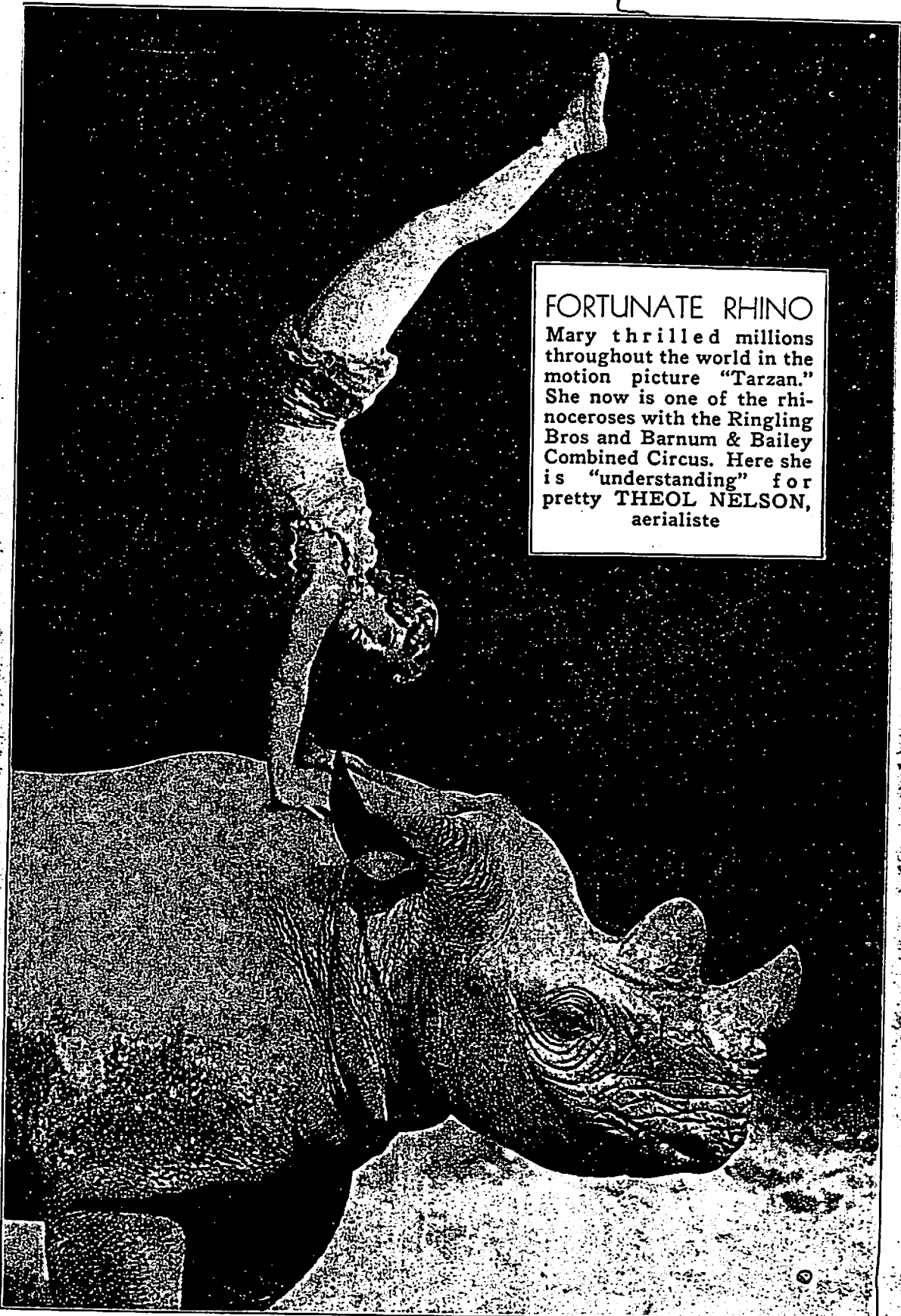
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
