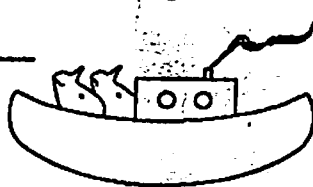

you don't know how sorry I am.

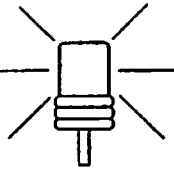
Durer saw you as if dressed

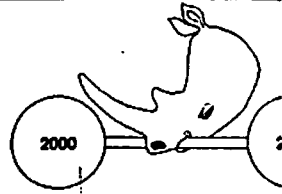

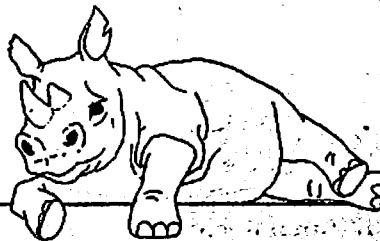
Two-Ton Trivia

- A black rhino does not have any front teeth.
- When he walks and runs the rhino goes on tiptoe.
- Oxpecker birds and cattle egrets eat ticks and insects off the rhino skin and from its nose and ears. They also warn the rhino of danger.
- Black rhinos have no hair on their skin except on their eyelashes and the tips of their tails and ears.
- Rhinos have good hearing. They can twist their ears around to hear in all directions.
- Rhinos have small eyes on the sides of their head; they can only see to the sides.
- Rhinos can smell very well. They use their noses to find their way about and to choose the food they want to eat.
- Although they are heavy and bulky, rhinos can gallop round corners and change direction quickly, and they can run as fast as 45 k.p.h. over a short distance.

SAWARA YOU?

From SAWARA, publication of the East Africa Wildlife Society:

"In a move that could be crucial in halting the extinction of rhino in the wild, the North Yemen government has agreed to take major steps to close down their country's illegal trade in rhino horn.

"Lucy Vigne and Esmond Bradley Martin's project to close down the trade in rhino products resulted in a trip to North Yemen where they urged the government to take stringent action against illegal imports of rhino horn. They followed up trade statistics gleaned from their monitoring of rhino horn exports from East and Central Africa. Thanks to their efforts and those of other conservationists world-wide, almost all the rhino horn consuming countries have now banned rhino-horn imports. However, illegal trade remains a problem in several Asian Cities; Martin and Vigne are trying to decrease the amount of rhino horn being made available and are also encouraging use of substitutes for it."
