Tot opheffing van het Fideicommissair Verband op de Plaats ROODEBLOEM.

Nademaal de gezamenlyke Erfgenamen van wylen de Weduwe Hendrik Oostwald Laubscher, eene Petitie aan Zyne Edelheid den Luitenant Gouverneur aan de Kaap de Goede Hoop hebben gepresenteerd, verzoekende dat het Fideicommissair Verband op de Plaats Roodebloem, een gedeelte der Natenschap van gezegde Weduwe, waaronder de gezegde Plaats was vermaakt aan wylen Hendrik Oostwald Laubscher, by een Codicil, gedateerd 19 October 1781, gevoegd by het Testament van wylen Pieter Laubscher en wylen zyne Huisvrouw Johanna Eksteen, door gezegde Testateurs gepasseerd op den 20 December 1779, voor den Commis ter Koloniale Secretary, den Hr. J. M. Horak, zoude mogen worden te niet gedaan:

En nademaal de gezegde Petitie aan den Ed. Achtb. Raad van Justitie is gerefereerd, welke, de belanghebbende partijen daarop gehoord, en met hun goedvinden, het toestemmen van hun verzoek heeft aanbevolen; zoo wordt by deze verklaard en vastgesteld, dat van en na dato dezer, de bovengemelde Plaats, genaamd Roodebloem, ontheven is van het Fideicommissair Verband, daarop gelegd door het Codicil voormeld, met uitzondering voor zoo verre daarin door gezegde gezamenlyke Testateurs is verklaard dat het hun wil en verlangen is, dat de Begraafplaats van gezegde Plaats Roodebloem, met den Muur om dezelve, als zoodanig zal blijven het gemeen eigendom van alle hunne Nakomelingen, met vryheid voor een ieder van hun dezelve te verkiezen tot de plaats waar zyn of haar lyk zal begraven worden; zynde het voornemen dat dit gedeelte van het Codicil in volle kracht en uitwerking zal blijven; en de toekomstige Eigenaars of Bezitters van de Plaats Roodebloem, zullen gehouden zyn de Nakomelingen van voormelde Testateurs te vergunnen een vryen doortocht over de Plaats Roodebloem naar de gezegde Begraafplaats, wanneer zulks door hen noodig zal worden geoordeeld tot het begraven van het lyk van eenigen overledenen Nakomeling van gezegde Testateurs, of tot het repareren of maken van verbeteringen in of aan gezegde Begraafplaats of den Muur om dezelve.
