6. MENAGERIE.

The number of animals belonging to the first three classes of Vertebrates living in the Society's Menagerie at the close of 1876 was 2265. The corresponding number on the 31st of December, 1875, was 2205, as will be seen by the subjoined Table:—

The total number of registered additions to the Menagerie in 1876 was 1219, of which 533 were acquired by presentation, 316 by purchase, 171 were bred in the Gardens, 172 were received on deposit, and 27 obtained in exchange.

The most noticeable event connected with the Menagerie in 1877 was the deposit in the Gardens of the fine collection of Indian animals belonging to the Prince of Wales.

The Collection arrived in May, 1876, in excellent order, under the charge of our Assistant Superintendent (Mr. Clarence Bartlett), who in 1875 had received special leave of absence from the Council, for the purpose of accompanying the Prince of Wales during his Indian tour as

Zoological Collector. The Collection remained, it is needless to say, a source of very great attraction to the Fellows of the Society and to the visitors to the Gardens throughout the summer, and tended very materially (as has been already stated) to increase the Garden receipts.

The Council wish publicly to express the obligations which are due from the Society to His Royal Highness for having placed the Collection under their charge, the result having been, as has already been pointed out, a very considerable increase of the number of visitors to the Gardens, and a marked augmentation of their general popularity.

Moreover, of the animals mentioned above, the Prince of Wales was pleased to present to the Society two Tigers, two Leopards, an Elephant, two Antelopes, and two Tragopans. And the Council have great pleasure in announcing that The Prince of Wales has consented to accept the Society's Gold Medal, which they have unanimously agreed to offer to His Royal Highness in acknowledgment of the valuable services thus rendered to the Society.

A special sum of £600 was devoted in 1876 to the acquisition, from Mr. W. Jamrach, of a female Sumatran Rhinoceros, which had remained on deposit in the Gardens since the preceding July. This acquisition raised the number of these animals now living in the Society's Collection to five, belonging to five different species, as will be seen by the following List of Rhinoceroses which have been exhibited in the Society's Collection since its first institution:—
