RHINOCEROS.—The only specimen ever brought to this country; on its passage from India to England, it died and was then sold for \$1600. It measures ten feet from the nose to the tail and nine feet in girth. In size the Rhinoceros is only exceeded by the elephant, but in strength superior. Its nose is armed with a formidable weapon, peculiar to their creature, being a very hard and solid horn, with which it defends itself from the most ferocious of animals, it fears not the Lion, Tiger or Elephant.—The body and limbs are covered with a skin so thick and hard that it turns the edge of a scimitar, and even resists the force of a musket ball. It is supposed to be the Unicorn of Holy writ, and possesses all the properties ascribed to that animal.—This specimen is placed in the Museum only for a short time, and will go to the South after the 13th of October. During this month the Philosophical experiments commence at half past 8 o'clock every evening. Admittance at all times 25 cents, children half price.
