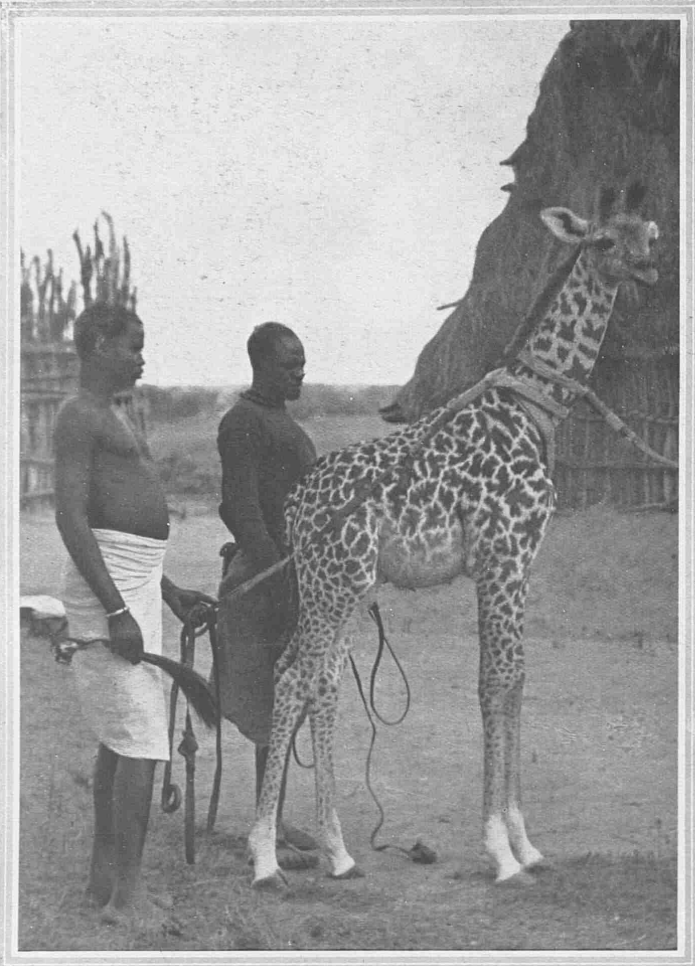


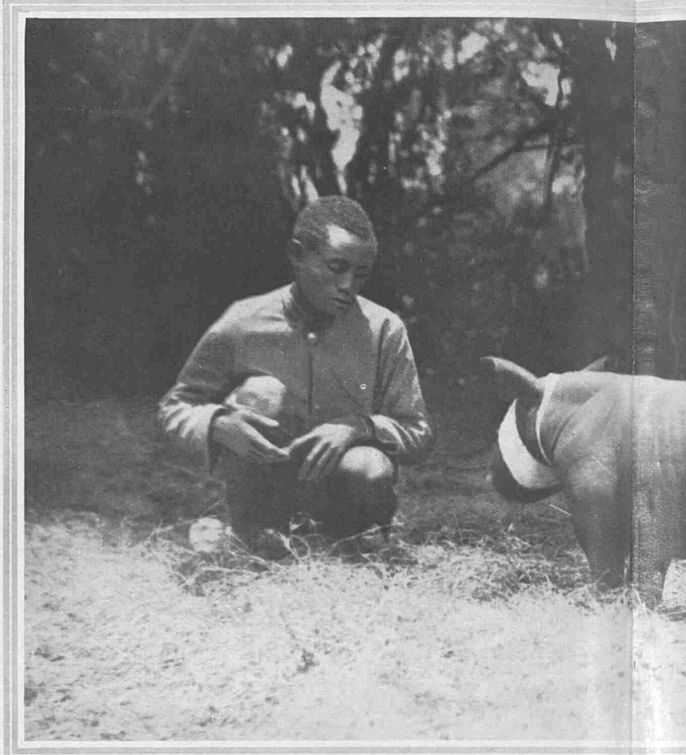
# Capturing BABY ANIMALS

*One and Two Months Old Animals*



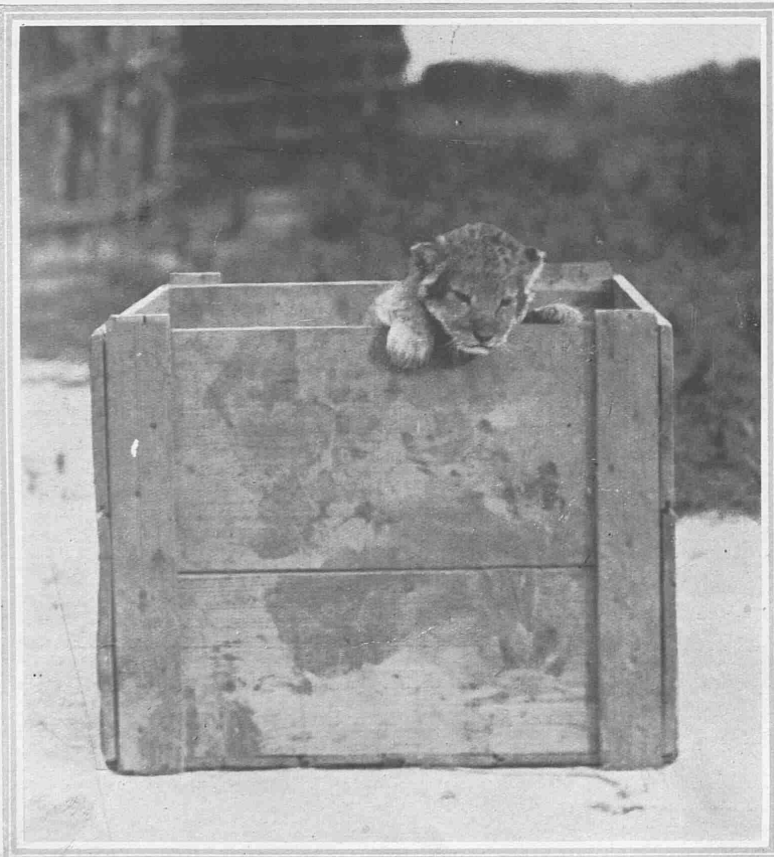
**A Two-months-old Giraffe and his Native Attendants**

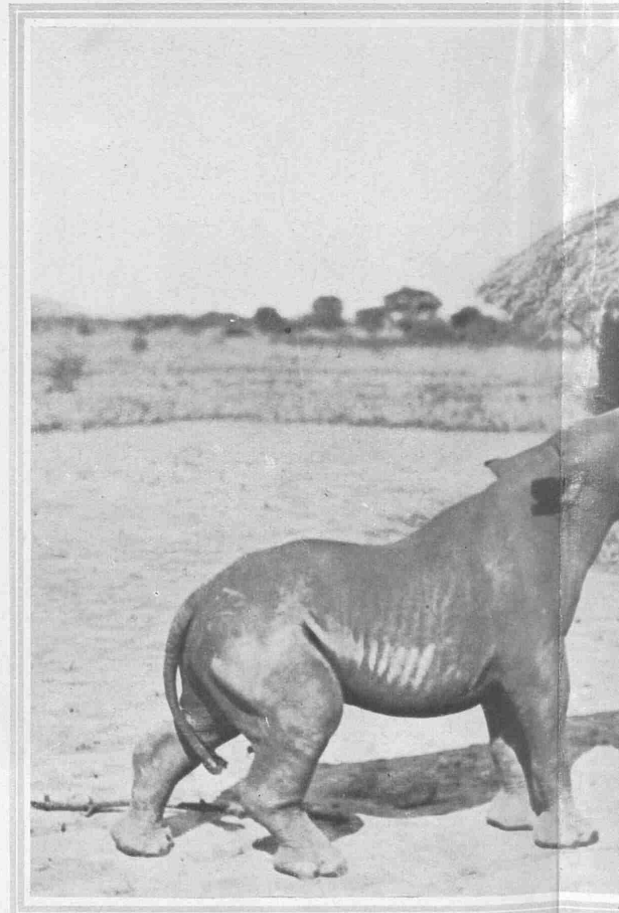
**A Baby Rhinoceros with its Head Bandaged After**

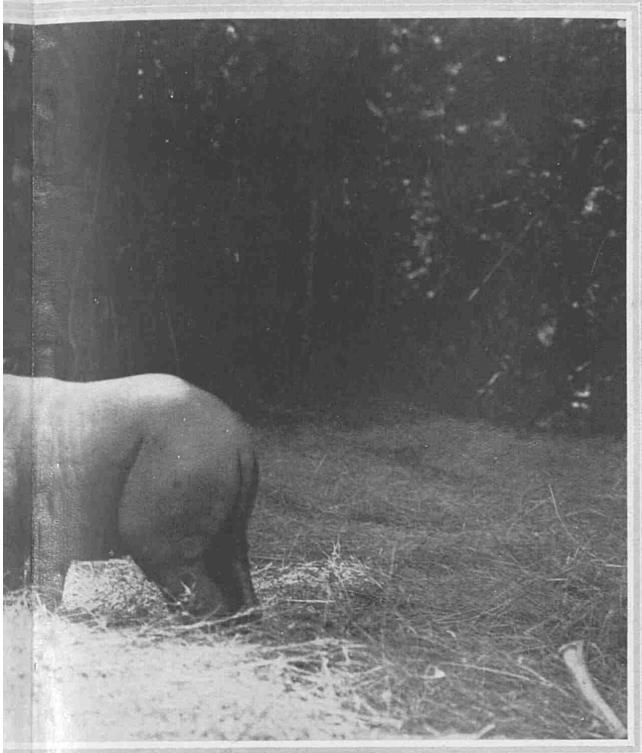


**A One-month-old Rhinoceros Baby Being**

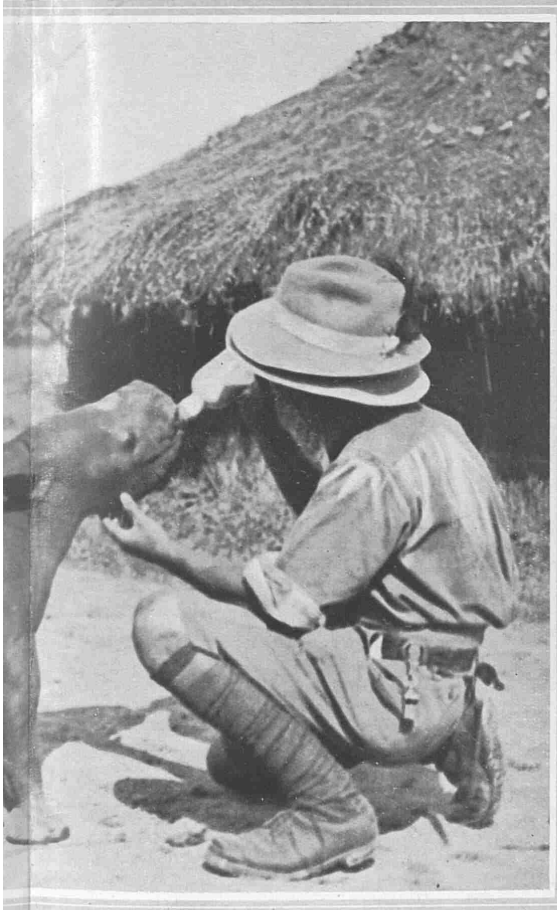


Wounded After Being Separated from its Mother

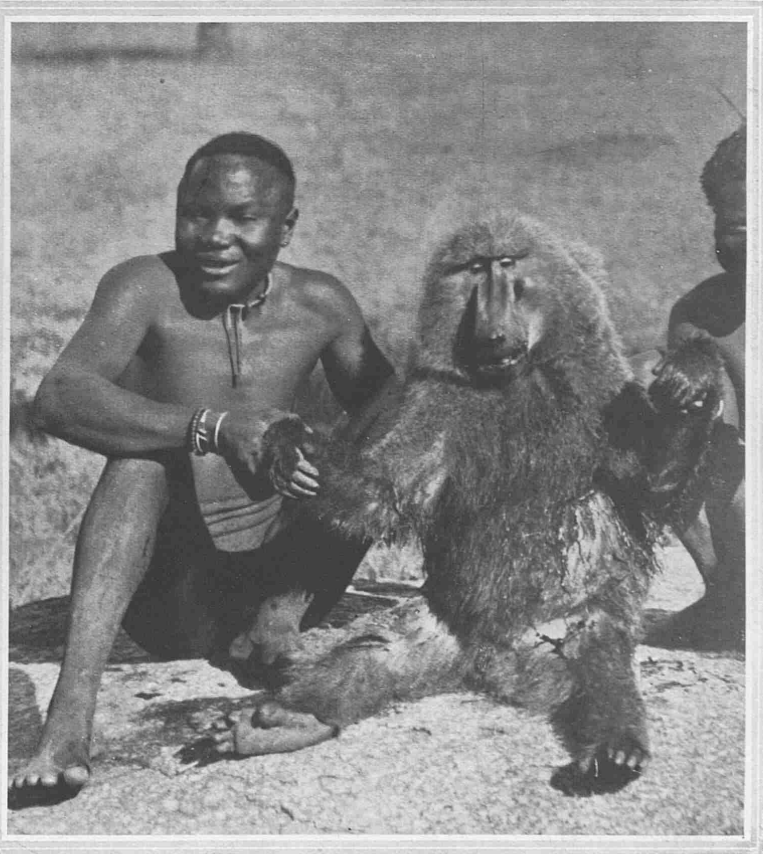
Wagaya Warriors in their Painted War Dress
