There are however, multiple connotations (polysemy) in the name tausug, meaning one or all of: a) speaker of Tausug as first language and participant in recognized Tausug adat, b) acknowledging the suzerainty of the Sultan of Sulu, or c) being a Moslem.

RHINO SIGHTINGS IN SABAH

In 1972 I surveyed an area in Ulu Karamuak where I had found evidence of a rhinocerous in 1960. After a five day search in all directions, I discovered no evidence of rhinocerous. I chose to check this area in preference to others in which I had seen evidence of rhinos because I knew it was undisturbed by logging operations.

I also heard from a Tambunan man born in 1903 that between 1923 and 1928 rhino licenses were available at \$25 per animal and one man got caught for killing two rhinos with only one license.
