With the death of Jimmy the Zoo has lost a favourite whose popularity was almost as great as that of the long-deceased Jumbo, or of Sally, the little chimpanzee, whose death occurred a year or so back. It is true that Jimmy's popularity was due rather to the peculiarities of his species than those social traits which were the distinguishing characteristics of Jumbo and Sally, his departed colleagues. Made famous by the many Zoo alphabets, without which the library of no modern nursery is complete, he was a great favourite with the children. Forforty years a well-behaved and highly respected inhabitant of Regent's Park, only once in all that time did Jimmy go on the "rampage"

and on that occasion, after doing his level best to root up the railings of his enclosure, he was forced to retreat minus the horn from which his species takes the name


