


3. An Herb call'd Houssek, like an Artichoak transplanted to the top of a House. Vita tamen super est. It still lives, tho' it is no longer in the Earth.

4. An Herb call'd Marjoram, and a Hog fmelling to it, but does not like the Scent. Non tibi Spiro. I'm not for your Nofe.

5. A Plant which produces Calebaces with Veffels full of Water, and the Calebaces inclining to them. Nullo dosente Magistro. They do it naturally.

6. A Trufs of Hay. Hoc omnis caro.
All Flesh is Grass.
7. A Tuberose. Diarii omnes. All short-liv'd. So is Beauty.
8. A Crown of Laurel, another of Oak, and a third of Palm, link'd together.
Mis Ornari ant mori. We must be crown'd with them, or die and be forgotten.

9. A Plant from which the Seeds fall again to the Ground. Spes altera vite. We ought to hope for a fecond Life. 10. An Elephant in the Water, looking at the Sun. Pura placet pietas. Pure Piety pleafes God.


11. A Rhinoceros rubbing his Horn against a Rock. Non revertar inultus. You shall be punish'd by it.

12. An Elephant playing with a Lamb. Mansuetis Grandia cedunt. The most Exalted stoop to the Humble.

13 A Rhinoceros killing a Bear with his Horn. Vim Sufcitat in Anger renews my Strength.

14. A Lion with a Snake round his Neck. Nil decentius. Nothing is better coupled than Prudence and Courage.
