A parthenogenetic egg needs no fertilization from a male because it inherits and duplicates the mother's chromosomes.

Miráq, a one-month-old endangered okapi, made his public debut at the Houston Zoo on Tuesday, 9 December 2014. Okapi are solitary animals, also known as the "forest giraffe," and are native to the Democratic Republic of the Congo in Central Africa.

#### **THE WILDS**

Cumberland, Ohio

A male southern white rhino
born at the Wilds on 12
November 2014 is the first
fifth generation white rhino
born on record outside
of Africa. The Wilds is a
10,000-acre conservation
center that produced the first
fourth generation white rhino
outside of Africa in 2009. The
Wilds remains the only facility to
produce fourth generation calves;
seven have been born to date.

A baby Bornean orangutan was born on 5 October 2014 at the Cleveland Metroparks Zoo. It's the first orangutan birth at the Zoo since 2006. The Zoo participates in the Bornean Orangutan Species Survival Plan® (SSP).

The Aquarium of the Pacific announced that it is the first to be able to successfully reproduce zebra sharks through artificial insemination. The pair of 10-month-old sharks are now on exhibit in the Aquarium's Shark Lagoon shallow pool.
