Brookfield - Ill. - U.S.A.

During the month of May, the season started shifting into "high gear". The yards, buildings and mechanical systems were put into service with the onset of warm weather, and animals shifted to outdoor enclosures. Births included: 6 Sitatunga, 3 Grey Fox, 1 Clouded Leopard, 1 Canada Lynx, 2 Dall Mountain Sheep, 1 Addax Antelope, 1 Squirrel Monkey, 1 L'Hoest Monkey, and a trio of Agouti in a large ecology display in the Small Mammal House, which are growing at a very rapid rate.

A Tarsier was born in April, but died in May, living a total of 15 days. It is the longest lived captive born specimen in the USA, to our knowledge. The female tarsier also died, about 1 month after the birth. At that point the other two specimens went "off feed" temporarily, but the including of a nest box and some patient coaxing with choice food seemed to bring them around.

The Bird Department acquired a pair of Sheppmaker Crowned Pigeons which acclimated quickly to the Perching Bird House "Free Flight" section. Four Darwin's Rheas also arrived to join the original herd acquired a month prior. Hatchings included the very rare event of 2 Road-runners..... the parents did an excellent job of rearing the young. A complete report of this event is being undertaken at this time.

The new Penguin Exhibit is being remodeled at this time, with completion date being set for the end of the summer, if all goes well. The structure will be constructed out of fiberglass.

One large Reticulated Python (a well-marked individual originating from Bangkok, Thailand) was purchased and placed on exhibit with the other lone individual. We hope this is indeed a pair..... both are feeding very well, and share the cage with a Physignathus Water Dragon and a colony of Cuban Anoles. A large Rana goliath arrived during this month from Spain on a trade basis.

Lyman Carpenter joined the Brookfield Zoo staff as Curator of Exhibits, and completed a "New Exhibits" presentation installed in one of the vacant buildings on the premises. The purpose of the building is to
