### Frankfurt - Germany

From Liberia rare birds have arrived in the Frankfurt am Main Zoo's new Pheasantry: some White-breasted Guinea-fowl (*Agelastes meleagrides*).

New in the Jewel Hall of the zoo's new Bird House are some Point-Tailed Finches (*Poephilia acuticanda*).

### Helsinki - Finland

Two Kenya Eagle Owls from the London Zoo have hatched eggs in the Helsinki zoo this year. ("Animals")

### Karachi - Pakistan

Our correspondent has informed us that the well known Dr. A. A. Quereshi has been transferred from the post of Curator of the Karachi Zoological Gardens, and has been made Chief Meat Inspector.

The zoo is now under the supervision of the Horticulturist.

### Khartoum - Sudan

A male Hippo is new in the collection of the Khartoum Zoo; it is the son of the well known breeding couple Toni and Gretel of the Frankfurt-am-Main Zoo, Germany.

This is the second Frankfurt Zoo animal now in this zoo; the first was a South American Tapir.

### Los Angeles - Calif. - U.S.A.

Large-scale building is on hand at Griffith Park in Los Angeles, where plans are ready for the completion of the first stage in the creation of the Los Angeles World Zoo by July 1964. This stage will cover 65 acres, plus 28 acres of parking space, and will cost 6,600,000 dollars. ("Animals")

### Nagoya - Japan

On 9th September, 1963, "Macany" the female Indian Elephant of the Nagoya City Zoo died at the age of 61 years. Macany and Eldo were the only Elephants that survived the second World War in Japan. (Juro Hayashi)

### Naples - Italy

On 27th May 1963, an Abyssinian Klippspringer (*Oreotragus oreotragus*) was born in this zoo. As far as we know, this is the first successful zoo breeding of this species. (F.d.K.Z.)

### New York - N.Y. - U.S.A.

The young Ribbon Seal at the Bronx Zoo's Aquarium is a very rare exhibit; in fact, it is the only one in the United States. It was captured last spring in Alaska.

Late fall 1963 a new animal exhibit was opened in the woods east of the present Roosevelt Elk range at the Bronx Zoo. Behind a 135-ft moat, and surrounded by a fence, three Wisents have a new home.

Two Bushmasters have been given to the Bronx Zoo; they have been placed in an air-conditioned exhibition section in the hope that at least one of them will accept food and survive. (A.K.)

### Oklahoma City - Okl. - U.S.A.

Recently the Lincoln Park Zoo at Oklahoma City was fortunate in being able to place on exhibition a female Red Colobus Monkey (*Colobus badius*) and a pair of the Kikuyu Mantled Colobus. The zoo has also added in recent weeks many rare species including a pair of Southern White Rhino, 1-2 Sable Antelope, a female ♂ Addax, 1-2 Lion-tailed Macaque, a female Siberian Tiger and a pair of African Elephants. ### Philadelphia - U.S.A.

A Malay Tapir (*Tapirus indicus*), one of the world's rarest mammals, is on exhibition at the Philadelphia Zoo. It is the first one the zoo has had since 1930 and is a male of about eighteen months old. (AAZPA Newsletter)

### Rotterdam - Holland

On 14th October a fully grown male Leopard arrived from the Zoo at Colombo, Ceylon. This male will form a couple with the female already in the Blijdorp Zoo's collection.

Bad news from the Sea lions' pool: the male Southern Sea Lion (*Otaria byronia*) has died. The death was caused by a large stone, which a visitor had thrown into the pool.

### San Diego - Calif. - U.S.A.

A 13½ month old, male Indian Rhino was placed on public exhibit recently at the San Diego Zoo. This zoo now has three of the world's five species of rhinos. This specimen came from the Basel Zoo, Switzerland.
