• FIRST POST-WAR PIGMY HIPPO BORN

On June 30th, 1964, the West Berlin Zoo's female Pigmy Hippo Ghana gave birth to her first offspring, a strong bull calf. Mother Ghana is now six years of age and father Gumbu four, both reared at the Basle Zoo.

This is the first Pigmy Hippo born in Germany since the war, and we hope it will be the beginning of the successful breeding of this rare species at the Berlin Zoo again. After the acquisition of the first Pigmy Hippo in 1913, altogether eight young ones had been born in Berlin between 1921 and 1940.

• AID FOR THE RED COLOBUS

The Red Colobus Monkey is found only on the island of Zanzibar and its continued existence is seriously threatened — so much so that efforts for its preservation are being undertaken by the Tigoni Primate Research Centre of Kenya.

The New York Zoological Society has contributed \$ 2,500 to the effort. A similar sum has been granted to the Instituto Mexicano de Recursos Naturales Renovables for the translation into Spanish of Dr. Starker Leopold's book, "Wildlife in Mexico".
