

THE SMALLEST DEER FROM CHILE




The Pudu (Pudu pudu) - the smallest American Deer, is in danger; it will be known to you that this mammal is on the list of endangered animals.

Mr. Carlos Junge, Director and owner of the Zoological Gardens at Chillan Viejo, Chile, informed us that he has been fortunate enough to acquire a fine couple of these rare deer.

Very soon a suitable building will be completed, where these deer will find a good home. Mr. Junge will try to breed them in the near

This newly arrived couple represent the success of an indefatigable attempt tot acquire them; for more than five years Mr. Junge has been looking for them.

When a breeding herd has been successfully built up, the young will later be sent to well known zoos interested in the saving of these deer.



Prof. Dr. Bernhard Grzimek has been elected President of the "Deutscher Naturschutzring" (German association for protection of nature). In this association are incorporated all unions of hunters, conservationists, naturalists, ramblers etc. with two million members. Being one of the strongest unions in West Germany it will influence politicians and administrations to safeguard wildernesses and the last untouched landscapes against cultivation and melioration, because they are much more important in cultural and economical respects for modern mankind then when transformed to interior agriculture. It also will help overseas countries in the preservation of Nature.
