ZIMBABWE'S RHINO WAR

[*Swara*, September/October, 1989]

First the good news. There has been a sharp drop in the number of rhinos lost to poachers, from 149 in '87 to 62 in '88 to only 21 by the end of June, '89. Since 1985 just under 600 are now known to have been killed while at the same time over 300 have been successfully translocated out of the lower Zambezi Valley. A recent survey suggests a remaining rhino population of between 500-600, and Zimbabwe's conservationists would like to stop translocating them and try to protect these in their natural habitat.

And now for the bad news. In order to protect the remaining rhinos, a force of 500 game scouts would be needed as compared with the 100 currently fielded by Operation Stronghold. The World Wildlife Fund has withdrawn its support of the anti-poaching helicopter which was the kingpin of the effort. Although the it is still flying thanks to an anonymous benefactor, its future is not secure.

Gun battles between poachers and park rangers have occurred throughout a larger area of the national parks. Hwange National Park was thought to be one of the safe areas where rhinos captured in the Zambezi Valley could be released. After a gun battle last year which left two Zambian poachers dead (though no rhinos were lost), this is a

very serious setback.

The ultimate success of Operation Stronghold also depends on Zambia, but so far efforts to persuade it to take serious action to curtail the poaching from its side has had little success. Zambia has to first even admit it has a problem. It is suggested that poachers are being recruited in the suburbs of Lusaka and supplied with modern weapons and ammunition leading one to suspect that corruption exists at levels well above that of the poachers themselves. The Zambian government denies this accusation and has even threatened libel action against Britain's Sunday Telegraph.

Good can come from evil. Last December, the chief warden of Zimbabwe's parks, Mr. Glen Tatham, was involved in an incident in which a Zimbabwean poacher was killed. This led to his temporary imprisonment with murder charges against him and resulted in low morale among the anti-poaching forces. At the same time, there was an upsurge in the success rate of the poachers with 17 rhinos lost that same month. The upside was that charges were not only dismissed against Tatham but a bill was drafted in Zimbabwe's parliament to protect anti-poaching personnel against murder charges if they

kill poachers. The Protection of Wildlife Indemnity Act was quickly passed, placing the law unambiguously on the side of the anti-poaching forces.

The key to protecting the remaining rhinos in the lower Zambezi Valley is early detection and interception of poachers before they've had a chance to kill. The sad fact is that Zimbabwe's parks haven't the resources or the manpower to be able to eliminate a rate of attrition which, however low, will inevitably reduce the rhino population to a level no longer genetically viable.

A new harrowing twist involves the oil exploration contract for the whole Zambezi Valley which is about to be signed between Zimbabwe and the Mobil Oil Corporation. Oil exploration will almost certainly result in increased access to the more remote parts of the rhino habitat, and give new opportunities to poachers.

It's not too late to halt the rhino's decline in Zimbabwe, but what is needed is money. If any of you are so inclined, please write to Mobil and tell them of your concern. They probably won't stop the exploration, but maybe they will donate some money to help save the remaining rhinos in the Valley.


(sung to "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer")

How about some more children's books that have rhinos in them? I could not find any new books only about rhinos. Here are some recent titles with very good illustrations include rhinos. Go to the best bookstore in your town and you'll probably find them and if not, the store can order them. It's not too late for the holidays.

Lucretia the Unbearable by Marjorie Weinman Sharmat. Illustrated by Janet Stevens. Holiday House, 1981. Lucretia is a hypochondriac and a kvetch. She thinks she is dying so of course she visits the doctor who is - a rhino!

Awful Aardvark by Mwalimu & Adrienne Kennaway. Little, Brown, 1989. Aardvark likes to sleep at night which wouldn't be so bad, except he snores terribly. All the jungle animals try to get him to shut up, including the rhino, but it is the smallest animal which saves the day, er night. I bought the book not only because of the rhino but because the illustrations were colorful & eye-pleasing.

The Queen of Eene. Poems by Jack Prelutsky. Pictures by Victoria Chess. Greenwillow Books, 1978. If you have children, the chances are good that they have heard of Jack Prelutsky. Oh, maybe they don't remember his name, but they probably have read his award-winning book, *New Kid on the Block*. Prelutsky's poems, akin to Shel Silverstein's, are whimsical and yet there is a lesson in there somewhere. This book has not one, but two poems which mention rhinos, and of course, there are rhino pictures to accompany the poems: ("Four Foolish Ladies" and "Aunt Samantha" (who wakes up one morning to find a rhino on her head.))

The Eleventh Hour; a Curious Mystery by Graeme Base. Harry N. Abrams, 1989. If you've seen *Animalia*, you know what Base's illustrations are like. They are rich and deep and leap off the page. His "R for Rhinoceros" was worth framing. Now in his new book, the author/illustrator has outdone himself. Anyone who knows about *Where's Waldo?* will appreciate this puzzle-story which unfolds as an elephant invites some guests to his eleventh birthday party. The party is marked by eleven games preceding the banquet to be eaten at the eleventh hour, but when the time to eat arrives, the birthday feast has disappeared. The reader is invited to guess the thief. The answer to the mystery is actually sealed at the end of the story which is in rhyme.




