

# REALLY, RHINOS!



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## ENDANGERED? NOT ENDANGERED?

According to a recent Associated Press article, Kenya's population of black rhinoceroses, prized by poachers for their unusual horn, is on the increase according to George Muoho, Minister of Tourism and Wildlife. He says that a new survey shows the number of black rhinos in four special reserves at about 600, 100 more than they estimated a year ago. He attributed the higher figure to improved survey techniques, stiffer anti-poaching measures and better breeding conditions in the rhino sanctuaries at four national parks. Private wildlife conservation experts

generally have placed the number of rhinos in this East African nation at well below government estimates, but Muoho said the new survey indicates "the situation is not as desperate as some people have tended to make it sound." In the early 1970s there were thought to be 60,000 black rhinos in Africa. Most private estimates put the figure at about 3,000 today. Concerned about mounting assaults on wildlife, the government late last year issued shoot-to-kill orders to law officers. Since then, at least 12 poachers have been killed and dozens arrested.

## ZOONOOZ

The Washington Park Zoo (4001 S.W. Canyon Road, Portland, OR) is just finishing an \$8 million Africa Exhibit. Pete, a 20-month old black rhino, is the \$25,000 star of the exhibit. The 1,200 pound people lover will be the first black ever shown in Oregon. Two phases of the exhibit replicate the dry, open plains of East Africa and will feature many of the large animals and birds of that region in natural settings. The exhibit, including Pete, a future mate, hippos, impalas, giraffes, zebras, marabou storks, ostriches and pythons, is scheduled to open April 29th. Construction is due to start on a third phase, focusing on the equatorial African rain forests and featuring small animals like pygmy hippos.

Exhibit areas are connected by a meandering "Safari Walk" that weaves through the natural settings and permits zoo visitors to view the animals up close. The walk winds its way past a variety of grassy animal areas near a 68 foot-high aviary, which houses rare African birds, and to the "Treetops" regions, where spectators will stand on eye level with the giraffes.

## APRIL 1st

has a new baby black rhino, Pete, from Denver. They are currently looking for a suitable girlfriend for him.



**JAVA YOU SEEN ANY RHINOS LATE**

The rarest species of Asian rhino is under threat from poaching. With possibly only 60 Javan rhinos left in the wild, possibly up to have already been killed by poachers in the animal's last stronghold Ujung Kulon National Park in Indonesia. A conservation team is investigating the possibility of establishing a second population in another locality in Sumatra where the species once lived. Conservationists say the Javan rhinos have been able to survive because of the animal's inhospitable and nearly inaccessible habitat but despite the difficult terrain and poor visibility, poachers seem to have succeeded in killing the animals. Dense mountainous rainforest and thorny scrub jungle have also made it virtually impossible to determine rhino numbers.

In central Sumatra at least a dozen rhinos are killed in snares every year. One population alone has been reduced from about 100 in 1970 to around 15 today. There are no more than 600 Sumatran rhinos in the wild. Even with trade bans on imports of rhino products, rhino products are still in demand and hardly any known Sumatran population is safe from poachers according to internationally renowned conservationist, Dr. Esmond Bradley-Martin.

The illegal trade in rhino products still exists. Though the medicinal properties of rhino products has proven to be ineffective, the Chinese still persist in manufacturing medicines containing rhino products and exporting them all over the world. Many Chinese manufacturers are experimenting with water buffalo horn as a substitute for rhino horn but this is not very widespread.

Consider writing to the embassies of China, Singapore and Thailand as well as to your congressperson, and ask that they abide by the recommendations of the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES)
