



Once ranging extensively across the plains of the rivers Ganges, Indus and Brahmaputra, the greater one-horned rhino is critically endangered due to poaching and loss of habitat. 

RHINOCEROS BIOLOGY AND CONSERVATION

MAY 9 - 11, 1991

It was truly an experience

with one common purpose: how to save the world's remaining extant rhinos. Governmental representatives, zoo biologists, field biologists, representatives of non-governmental conservation organizations, veterinarians and academic scientists and one lone crazy rhino newsletter editor sat for three days of intense, and I mean intense presentations. It almost felt like an est seminar! International media covered the event. Especially gratifying were the times when people came up to me and made positive comments about the *Really, Rhinos!*

The basic scientific sessions included discussions of genetics, reproductive biology (a.k.a "sewer science"), veterinary medicine, and poster presentations provided new information about nutrition, disease, and other aspects of rhinoceros biology including the first report of vocal communication in both African and Asian rhinos involving subsonic sounds. Dr. Donald Prothero, paleontologist, spoke about the rhino's ancestors.

Other technical sessions focused on the status of each of the five rhino species, the development of the implementation of plans for conservation of rhinos in separate nations in which rhino populations survive and the status of the four species of rhinos currently held in zoological parks.







Some of his works were generously donated for a drawing at the International Rhino Conference and no I didn't win anything!!!!

Sharing a table with Robert were folks from Jungle Drums, a natural wildlife gallery. The color brochure I picked up makes me want to book my Delta flight right now. Kathleen and Jim Mazzotta and Michael LaTona, the gallery's owners, present some of the country's finest wildlife art while raising the awareness about our natural world's precarious position. Each month a wildlife

conservation group is selected and a portion of those sales are donated to that group. Every time you buy from Jungle Drums, you could be helping rhino worldwide. P.S. Michael owns Harlequin, the nation's leading silkscreen printer of wildlife images. If you know other animal collectors, tell them about Jungle Drums. I was able to pick up a great rhino bracelet (cut-out rhinos), a rhino ring (white rhino head) and a silver/copper African scene with white rhinos in it. I also got a beautiful piece of etched glass that rivals anything Swedish. And the prices were happily within my price range, i.e. most reasonable for the quality and uniqueness.
