## RHINO UPDATE; WWF AND NWF URGE SANCTIONS

[FOCUS, 15(1):1, January/February, 1993]

"Although international trade in rhino horn has been prohibited by CITES since 1977, four consumer countries - South Korea, China, Taiwan, and the Republic of Yemen- are doing little to control the illegal trade. In response, World Wildlife Fund and the National Wildlife Federation in late November petitioned the U.S. government under the Pelly Amendment to impose sanctions on the four countries.

Under the Pelly Amendment the U.S. can ban direct imports of wildlife products from countries that undermine the effectiveness of CITES programs for species such as rhinos.

Although no sanctions have ever been imposed through the Pelly Amendment procedure, conservationists credit the threat of sanctions in 1991 with influencing Japan's decision to ban all international trade of sea turtle products by 1994."

**NEWS FLASH!** Taiwan announced an immediate ban on the import, export, sale, and display of rhino horn. WWF applauds Taiwan's critical move to help shut down the illegal rhino trade.



## RHINO WOMAN

No, it's not me. If Michael Werihke is the "Rhino Man" then Anna Merz is the "Rhino Woman" For more than ten years, Anna has committed her life to rhino preservation on a 5,000 acre ranch (Lewa Downs). Below is an excerpt from an interview with Karen Kane which appeared in ZOOLIFE [Winter, 1993]

"With the blessings of the Kenya Wildlife Service, black rhinos were captured and released on the reserve now called Ngare Sergoi Rhino Sanctuary. At the present time it is home to nearly two dozen white and black rhinos. In just a decade the rhinos translocated there have produced 15 young. The Bowling for Rhinos fundraiser helps support this effort and in fact, the sanctuary has expanded to 45,000 acres (the entire Lewa Downs) and the adjoining 16,000 acres Ngare Ndare Forest Reserve owned by the Kenyan government. Nearly every species of East African animal (except hippos) live on the reserve. Two well-guarded openings in the fence allow for animal migration.

When asked what the most important thing she would want people to know about rhinos, Merz responded, "They are sensitive, intelligent animals. they have been on this earth for 60 million years and have adapted themselves in living quite comfortably among nonhuman creatures."

In describing the poaching around Ngare Sergoi, Merz commented that "the Somali Shifas are the most dangerous gangs of poachers. They travel from the north armed with machine guns. No one can stop them before they reach Ngare Sergoi. Fortunately, no rhinos have been lost to the poachers. Guards watch over the animals every day, and the electric fence alerts us to anyone who touches it. We are also fortunate in that the villagers near the reserve, who are very grateful to us because the fencing protects their crops from animals, are watchful of poachers too."

Merz' response to the dehorning of rhinos to protect them was, "it would be a shame to mutilate an animal to protect it, but I also think it is better to have a dehorned rhino than a dead rhino." (Rhinos at the sanctuary are property of the government whose policy is not to dehorn.)

When people in the U.S. ask how they can help rhinos, Merz suggests learning about them, "understand why they are such wonderful creatures and support organizations that work to protect them. Why anyone should help rhinos is akin to asking why anyone should help older people and innocent children. People should have reverence and respect for every living thing."

As you know, poachers have wiped out eighty-five percent of all species of rhino over the last twenty-five years. Additional funding and conservation measures must be implemented NOW if the rhino is to survive into the next century. And that is why your gift is so timely.





## UN ENVOY FOR RHINOS!

Excerpted from BBC Wildlife,  
11 February, 1993: 42-44.

In 1961, Sir Peter Scott predicted that the black rhino would be extinct in three decades and today, 32 years later, despite the WWF, SSP, Operation Rhino, Save the Rhino and all the other rhino-friendly organizations, the downward slope continues. Despite all the gloom and doom, there is hope. Now there is actually a UN Envoy for Rhinos and guess who it is? Yes! Esmond Bradley Martin! "People are finally realizing that it is possible to save the rhinos. I keep hammering away at the pessimists with success stories - successes which are in some of the world's poorest countries." Bradley Martin suggests that where there is a will there is a way provided

the will is at the highest political level. In Nepal, the king himself has ordered the protection of rhinos and the governments of both Kenya and India have provided sufficient political will and commitment to control the poaching.

After the shocking realization that Zimbabwe's black rhino population was only a quarter of what had been officially claimed in November, 1992, Dr. Mostafa K. Tolba, the executive director of the UN Environment Program (which among other things, administers CITES) reacted with unbureaucratic speed & in a matter of weeks he had created the post of UN Special Envoy for Rhinos, the first time this has ever been done for a species; provided funds to the Zimbabwe Wildlife Department for anti-poaching intelligence-gathering activities and co-funded a documentary film on the trade and his envoy's interviews with dealers.

Research in the U.S. indicated that there is no need to add toxins to rhino horn medicines as they already contain dangerous poisons put there by the manufacturers. Researchers at the Forensic Laboratory of the US Fish and Wildlife Service have discovered that rhino keratin has a lower molecular weight,

higher sulphur content and a lower pH value than keratin from other species. This is useful because to prosecute someone for importing rhino-horn medicines, it is first necessary to prove there really is rhino horn in the pills. In fact, unpublished reports reveal that in two brands of Asian medicinal tea balls, no traces of rhino-specific keratins were found. It would therefore appear that someone is being conned - not only are patients not getting the medicine they are paying for, they may actually be poisoning themselves or their children. Legal trade in these "medicines" has now been stopped in Taiwan and further exports from China are banned. But in China, the world's most populous nation, there are estimated to be nearly 8.5 tons of rhino-horn stock.

There is another way to bring pressure to bear on the rhino-trading countries: a clause in US law called the Pelley Amendment. It says that if any country can be shown to be undermining an international agreement to protect an endangered species, in this case CITES, the US government can ban imports of all wildlife products (including fisheries) from that country. The next CITES meeting will be in the US in 1994 and your letters

supporting this amendment are critical. How the US government stands on this issue will undoubtedly influence many other CITES member-countries as they cast their votes.

Some final words about CITES. The point of CITES is to protect species whose survival is being, or might be threatened by international trade. The failure of CITES to end the illegal rhino-horn trade is now being used as an excuse to restructure the whole convention, making its goals as much to do with continuation of trade as the protection of the species. CITES has not failed the rhino. It is the poor implementation of CITES - the failure of the people who matter to carry out the democratically voted decisions and resolutions of the people who mind. CITES can be likened to a dam across a river of rhino trade, with conservationists and customs officers in the role of the beavers. The dam is well built and most of the flow has been stopped but every time one leak is plugged, another one - another smuggling route - appears. Leakage is now down to a trickle, but the rhino populations are so low that there is a drought of rhinos to feed the trade - because for years there were more leaks than there were new rhinos. But the leaks are being plugged faster now

that rhinos have become the issue of the moment. If we succeed, we will then need a long period during which the rhino trade is totally dammed, and the level of rhinos allowed to rise. And the last thing the rhino puddle needs now is a sluice-gate of legal trade. Otherwise the rhinos will run dry, and Sir Peter Scott's dire prediction will come true - and only a few years behind schedule.




## ANOTHER BIRTHDAY TO CELEBRATE!


## **INVITE A RHINO TO LUNCH?**

Ever thought about inviting a rhinoceros to lunch? There are probably a couple of things you should know first. The rhino's table manners aren't the best. If it's been raining outside, chances are he'll walk into the dining room with mud up to his knees. Rhinos are big animals, about three times as large as a horse, so they have big appetites. Here's a suggested menu:

- 4 lbs. carrots (whole, not sliced)
- 2 lbs. bananas
- 2 lbs. large white potatoes
- 2 lbs. apples
- 2 lbs. green beans
- 2 lbs. oranges
- 1 lb. loaf of bread
- 25 lbs. of hay
- 1 large tub full of grain: corn, soybeans, oats and alfalfa with vitamins & minerals mixed in.

Stir to make a rhino cereal.

6 or 7 buckets of water.



Don't bother with a fancy tablecloth, he'll eat right off the floor. It's a good idea to have a mop handy. When he eats the oranges, he usually drools orange juice. The vegetables are good for him, please ask him not to hide his green beans in the corner, or step on them getting to the fruit.

He's a good natured fellow, though. Probably he won't mind if your canary perches on the bucket, while he's having a drink.





### BILL OF RHINO RIGHTS




