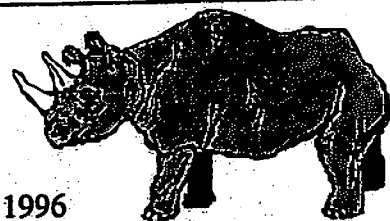

## Second Rhinoceros Born at the National Zoo in Six Weeks

The Smithsonian's National Zoo has a new infant rhinoceros. The greater one-horned Asian rhinoceros, Kali, gave birth to a male calf on Oct. 31 at 6:41 a.m. This is the second of the endangered species born at the National Zoo since Sept. 18, when the rhinoceros, Mechi, gave birth to a 138 lb. female calf which has been named Chitwan. The new calf, still unnamed (as of Nov. 1) is estimated to weigh about 60 lbs.



The sire of the new calf is Pandu (nicknamed Sport), who fathered Chitwan as well. Pandu was born on Aug. 8, 1980 at the San Diego Zoo and was loaned to the Smithsonian's National Zoo in 1985. In 1992, the San Diego Zoo donated the male to National Zoo. Three months ago, Pandu was sent to the Philadelphia Zoo to allow more space for the mothers-to-be to deliver and care for their calves. Pandu will return to the Zoo when the calves are weaned.

About 2,000 greater one-horned Asian rhinoceroses survive today and, like ore large animals, the species is threatened with extinction as its habitat is reduced by the activities of people. The National zoo participates in the American Zoo and Aquarium Association's greater one-horned Asian rhinoceros species Survival Plan. Institutions that take part in this program carefully plan the breeding and management of the species in a cooperative effort to insure its survival.

John Lehnhardt, Assistant Curator of Mammals and Elephant Mouse Manager, said, "We're very excited to have two births of such a rare species in such a short period of time. It's a good indication that zoo conservation programs are succeeding." The birth of the new calf was the first to be seen "on line." A digital camera located in the rhino enclosure is linked to the National Zoo's World Wide Web home page (<http://www.si.edu/natzoo>). The Webcam, donated by Stardot Technologies ([www.wincam.com](http://www.wincam.com)) provides an updated still shot every 3-1/2 minutes of Kali and son. Internet visitors may click on "New Zoo Births" on the opening screen and follow the pathway.

**Background:** The scientific name (genus and species) of these animals is *rhinoceros unicornis* (order: Perissodactyla; family: Rhinocerotidae). Asian rhinos are large with thick, armor-like skin. They have one horn, three toes per foot, excellent hearing and smell, but poor eyesight. Females are 4 to 5 feet tall at the shoulder, and males reach 5-1/2 to 6-1/2 feet tall at the shoulder. Females weight between 3,500 - 4,000 pounds, and males weight 5,000 - 6,000 pounds. Females reach sexual maturity between 6 to 9 years of age, and cycle every 45 days until conception. Gestation is about 16 months and calves are weaned between one and two years of age. Females calve every 3 to 4 years.

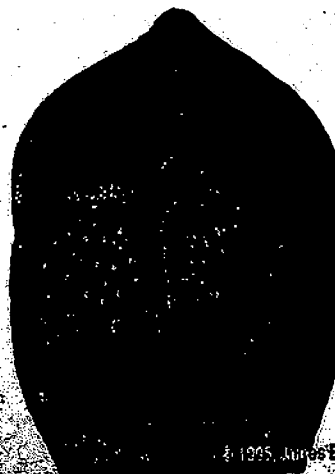

## Great Indian Rhinoceros



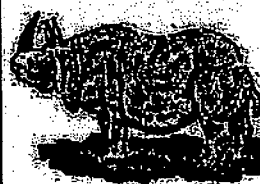
"Jordy." Photographed February 11, 1989, at Lowry Park Zoo, Tampa Florida. Six-year-old male.

Range: Highly pressured in isolated enclaves of India and Nepal, specifically the floodplains of the Ganges, Brahmaputra, and Indus River systems.

Cause of Endangerment: Habitat destruction due to human encroachment; illegally hunted for their horns.

Nearly half of the thirty-six Indian rhinos in North American zoos, including Jordy, are descended from a single ancestor. To avoid inbreeding with his own bloodline, Jordy has been exiled from the other Indian rhinos with whom he had previously lived. There is some chance that he will someday return from this exile-within-exile, and be paired with a mate fresh from the wild.

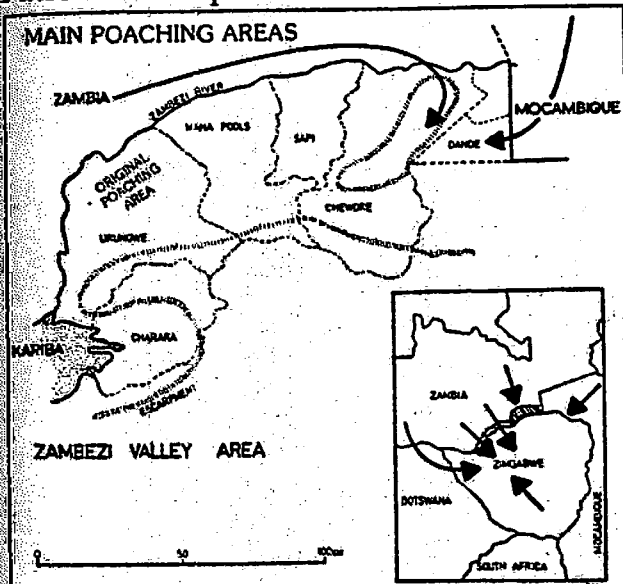
The day before we worked with Jordy, a female baboon in heat had sat on the background fabric, and he found her scent irresistible. He avidly sniffed and licked the background, all the while curling back his upper lip to expose a certain olfactory gland which plays a key part in breeding rituals. Our needs could not distract this rhino from his own, so we ended that session.



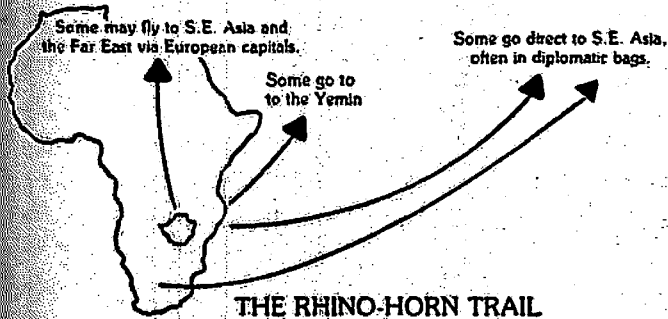

# RHINO SURVIVAL CAMPAIGN

The Zimbabwe Rhino Survival Campaign has been created by Zimbabwean non-governmental conservation societies and agencies in response to an appeal from the Parks and Wildlife Board of Zimbabwe for help in equipping the Department of National Parks and Wildlife Management's Anti-Poaching Patrols and Capture and Relocation Units.



The fund-raising for the RSC is controlled and administered by the Zimbabwe National Conservation Trust as the official umbrella organization coordinating all non-government conservation activities in direct liaison with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Tourism.



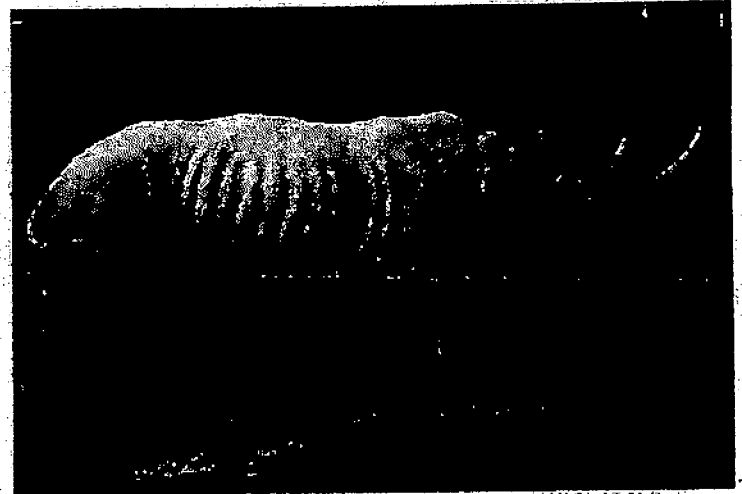

On the morning of August 19, to the delight of keepers at the San Diego Wild Animal Park, a clump of clay lying next to a Southern white rhino began to take shape. This little clump of dirt was actually a bouncing baby rhinoceros born to Komaas, a wild-caught female inhabiting the San Diego Wild Animal Park since 1971. Its clay-covered appearance sparked keepers to name the new arrival "Kutu" which means "rust" in Swahili. Keepers have seem nicknamed the little guy "Rusty."

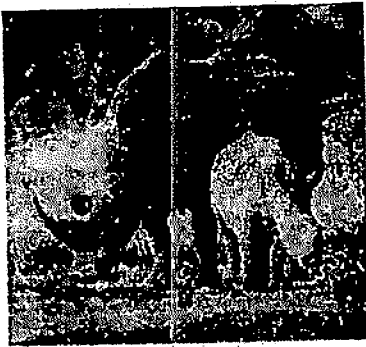

Kutu is the 112th calf of all rhino species born at the Park. And, there's more on the way. Currently, there are seven expectant rhino mothers at the Park: three black rhinos, three Indian rhinos and one Southern white rhino. 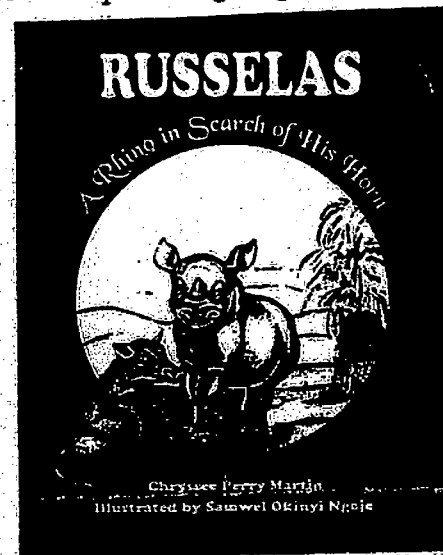

*Russelas: A Rhino in Search of His Horn* by Chryssee Perry Martin. Illustrated by Samwel Okinyi Ngoje. Jacaranda Designs, Ltd, 1995. (Available at Crown Bookstores)

Russelas is a rhino calf with a weakness for strawberries. When he wanders off one day, his adventure turns into a nightmare as he discovers his horn has been sawed off! Poor Russelas! How can he be a rhino without a horn? He is determined to find though which takes him on a worldwide hunt for his missing horn. Traveling to India, Singapore, Hong Kong and other sites which have rhinos (and unfortunately illegal rhino horns), Russelas meets a bevy of beasts and learns more about the plight of the world's rhinos. When he finally returns home and visits the author and her husband, famed conservationist, Esmond Bradley Martin at their home outside Nairobi National Park, Russelas discovers what Dorothy found when she visited Oz: there is no place like home, AND, rhino horns do grow back. This is a story for children of all ages. It has beautiful watercolors and a generous amount of photographs which assist the reader in understanding the history, present and possible future of the rhino. It is a picture book and a chapter book which adds to its versatility. Parents and children are always encouraged to spend time reading together. **GOOOOAAALLL RHINOS!!!** Professional soccer was hot in 1996. Though the Major League Soccer (MLS) took the general headlines, all intra-sport eyes were on the Rochester Raging Rhinos. As a new entry into the "A-League", Rochester became a model franchise. Intended to be a level below MLS, crowds in the 2,000-4,000 range are considered big for matches in this league. The Raging Rhinos blew that standard to bits by averaging over 11,000 in their new 15,000 seat Frontier Field.

On the field this team acted like a rhino. They stumbled to a poor record early while playing on astroturf. Opening in July, the new stadium's natural grass field was a compliment to the team's style and become a huge home-field advantage (rhinos like grass!) They charged ahead. 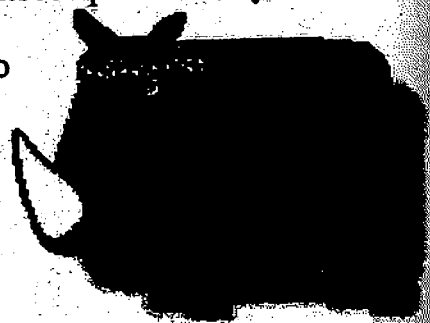
