






About the same time, the lion marched through the meadow roaring so loud that the earth shook. "I am the greatest! I am the strongest! I am the King of the Beasts!"

But the lion just laughed and flicked sand in her face with the tuft of his tail.



That night the squirrel, the mouse, and the frog called a meeting of all the little animals in the Land of a Thousand Shadows.


First the squirrel chattered, "I want to be big, so I can get even with the rhinoceros."

But the other animals were happy being small. One by one they hopped, crawled, skipped, and flew away.









Meanwhile the rhino, the lion, and the crocodile all woke up tiny. Bewildered, they stared at each other, then skulked away.



Pretty soon the lion happened to pass the little mouse. "Good morning," the lion greeted her warmly. "Is there anything I can do for you?"


"No, thank you, but it's nice of you to ask," the mouse squeaked back with a smile.
