As the whole world knows, it's been a ghastly year in Zimbabwe, both for the people and the wildlife! We've continued to support our various conservation projects in as big a way as ever and the **SAVE FOUNDATION** is proud to be one of the few remaining active donor NGOs.

Your continued membership and support of our activities is vital if we are to make an impact on the lives of the rhinos, in particular, and other wildlife we have assisted. We value your involvement, as do the many people working in the field.

The following is a synopsis of the main happenings of relevant activities in 2003.

26 RHINOS KILLED IN SINAMATELLA

The year started badly with 3 dead rhinos being found in early January, followed by 4 in February and 6 in April. By July the total number of poached rhinos had risen to 25 plus 1 killed in a fight. Sinamatella Intensive Protection Zone has been the most effective of the major National Parks' rhino projects and it's been a great disappointment to Warden Norman English and his 20-man anti-poaching unit. This number of men is far too few for the size of the area and a consortium of NGOs, lead by SIRAD, is in the process of employing and training 10 new scouts for patrol work.

The anti-poaching unit hit back in June and killed 3 poachers and captured a fourth. The same thing happened in Matusadona when 4 poachers were shot and 3 were captured.

\$65,000 RAISED AT DINNER/AUCTION

On Monday 6 October we held a most successful fund-raising evening at the Hyatt Regency Perth. Our special guests were Heath Streak and the Zimbabwe Cricket Team plus Matthew Hayden, just three days before his world breaking innings of 380! The celebrity panel was most professionally compered by Ken Casellas.

Auctioneer Chris Shellabear, masterfully sold all 60 items of sporting memorabilia, plus safaris, paintings and carvings. The highlight, entitled "Australia's Test Captains and Other Test Greats, 1948-2002", 2 fully signed bats from Bradman through to the present team, was purchased for \$22,500 by a local businessman, Gino Salomone, and is now proudly displayed in his showroom.

NEW HORN IMPLANT TECHNOLOGY

As an alternative to radio collars, radio transmitters are being fitted into the rhino's horn, producing exceptional tracking results. This process started in Sinamatella in May/June, was continued in September

and has now been used in Bubiana Conservancy, all under the skilful eye of hardworking veterinarian, Dr Chris Foggin. We are the donor of many of these transmitters and are committed to a further 50 in 2004.

30 RHINOS MOVED TO SAFETY

The combined skills of Chris Foggin from the Wildlife Veterinary Unit and Raoul du Toit from WWF resulted in 30 rhinos being moved from Bubiana Conservancy to Buby River Conservancy. This was necessitated due to over-crowding in an area now densely populated by illegal land occupants. One rhino had been shot previously on this land and a few killed by snare injuries.

We are committed to \$16,000 of monitoring and tracking equipment in the New Year, both to Bubiana and also to the Save Valley Conservancy. Both these projects have been most successful in the past 10 years and are suffering at the hands of the new land settlers, with the resultant need for better monitoring.

FURTHER \$25,000 FROM HUNTER HALL

Peter Hall, Managing Director of Hunter Hall Investment Management Ltd, has advised us that a further \$25,000 will be donated in the New Year, as voted by his management and shareholders. Thanks again for your ongoing support and you know that we will wisely and responsibly make use of this most generous donation.

GREG RASMUSSEN MICROLIGHT CRASH

Back in July we were horrified to hear the details of Greg's nasty accident, from which he was lucky to escape. Greg is head of the Painted Dog Research Unit at Hwange, and due to their recent decline from poaching and snare deaths, he was volunteering his tracking skills to the rhino project in neighbouring Sinamatella. Unfortunately, he came a cropper, but thanks to well-placed tree, he survived the impact with the ground; but not without great damage to his body, with just about every bone being broken from his hips to his toes! Greg is recovering in Harare and has progressed to hydrotherapy and should be allowed to try to walk within the next few weeks. We have contributed to his medical expenses, which certainly were putting a dent in the project's resources.

Get well soon, Greg, you are lucky to have such a great fighting spirit to see you back in the field again.

HWANGE GAME WATER SUPPLY

We are aware that National Parks is struggling to supply the necessary financial resources to maintain and refurbish water pumps and engines in the 80 pans of Hwange National Park, a naturally semi-arid area. We have recently purchased 4 new engines and will also be supplying spare parts to repair many of the broken down water holes. Looking to the future, we

are seeking the support of other Australian and overseas NGOs to put together a bigger project.
