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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

FUND RAISING DRIVE ACQUIRES NEW URGENCY

Whilst we are subjected daily to the horror, tragedy and scandals of Somalia and the former Yugoslavia, let us also remember that the African black rhino is fighting a major battle for survival. Its numbers have decreased from 65,000 some 20 years ago to less than 2,500 now.

For the past 8 years, Zimbabwe has been the last stronghold for these animals, but this title is now in contention. During the dehorning exercises of the past 3 months some horrific facts have come to light. As late as February 1992, the research branch of the Department of National Parks was claiming that Zimbabwe probably had some 1,500 wild black rhinos. These figures are now being somewhat rapidly revised downwards, in the light of the Matusadona experience (85% lost to poaching) and other field reports. "Best guesses" now centre around some 500 to 600 survivors, country wide.

The Zimbabwe tourist industry, based almost exclusively on the country's wildlife, is a major growth industry and expected to earn some \$400 million annually by 1994. The redirection of a small part of these earnings could solve the wildlife protection problem overnight. Sadly, a mere \$10 million of these proceeds is allocated to wildlife conservation, the rest finding its way into "general government expenditure". Hence SAVE is seeking your support more than ever before.

Glenn Tathan described the situation for the black rhino as being on the final lap of a long distance race, now entering the home straight. We believe the future of the black rhino in the wild will be determined

within the next year, and if it is not saved, then it clearly faces extinction in its natural habitat.

To help fund the necessary action being taken in Zimbabwe, SAVE is organising many events within the next few months, details of which can be found in this Newsletter. Please support them as much as you can, and also inform your friends of the work of SAVE and encourage them to become members.

It is worth reminding ourselves that ALL funds raised are spent wisely and responsibly at the direction of the Director of National Parks, or his Chief Warden, and that all our overheads are privately sponsored for maximum gain for SAVE.

Tax-deductible donation forms are available from your local SAVE office, by simply telephoning or writing in.

SAVE thanks the following companies for their recent donations of supplies for the Zimbabwe National Parks: Autoparts for some Toyota shock absorbers, Panasonic for several boxes of batteries, Westrail for ten superseded mobile radios and Officent Business Equipment for 15 rolls of fax paper. These were all safely delivered, courtesy of Qantas, in mid July.

Elsewhere you will read of the progress being made by SAVE in Sydney, Brisbane and Melbourne. This has largely been due to the enormous efforts of Stephen Ward, Richard Barzdo and Sue Pennicuik. Stephen and Richard are now taking a less active role in SAVE and we thank them for their valuable contribution over the past three-and-a-half years.

\$400,000 URGENTLY NEEDED FOR RHINO DEHORNING

Zimbabwe's Department of National Parks has taken the decision to dehorn all remaining rhinos which can be found, and initial estimates indicate that this will need aid to the value of about \$400,000.

Zimbabwe's conservation agencies are urgently appealing to the various international community organisations to support in whatever way possible, and funds have been received from Norway, U.S.A., Australia and England. In addition, local conservation organisations and tourist operators have funded the early work, particularly in the Matusadona National Park.

All hasn't been rosy in the early stages of the dehorning programme. Representation was made to the Government officials for approval to dehorn Zimbabwe's remaining rhinos, as early as last February. Due to bureaucracy, permission wasn't granted for three months, during which time a large number of rhinos were killed.

In addition, shamefully, a helicopter recently supplied by the International Black Rhinoceros Foundation has now been 8 weeks in Harare Airport awaiting customs clearance. One has to question Zimbabwe's commitment to their rhinos in view of these experiences, at a time when the helicopter's use is most vital. Helicopter hire is at the rate of \$500 per hour, and fixed winged spotter planes will cost \$100 per hour.

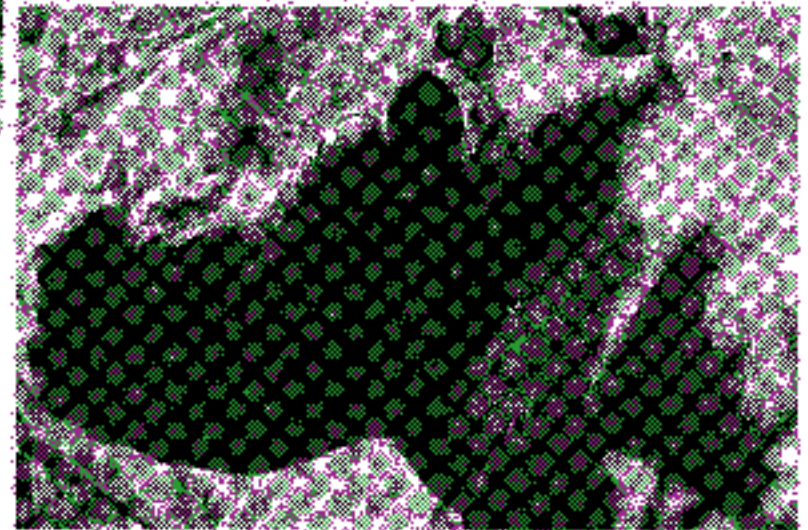
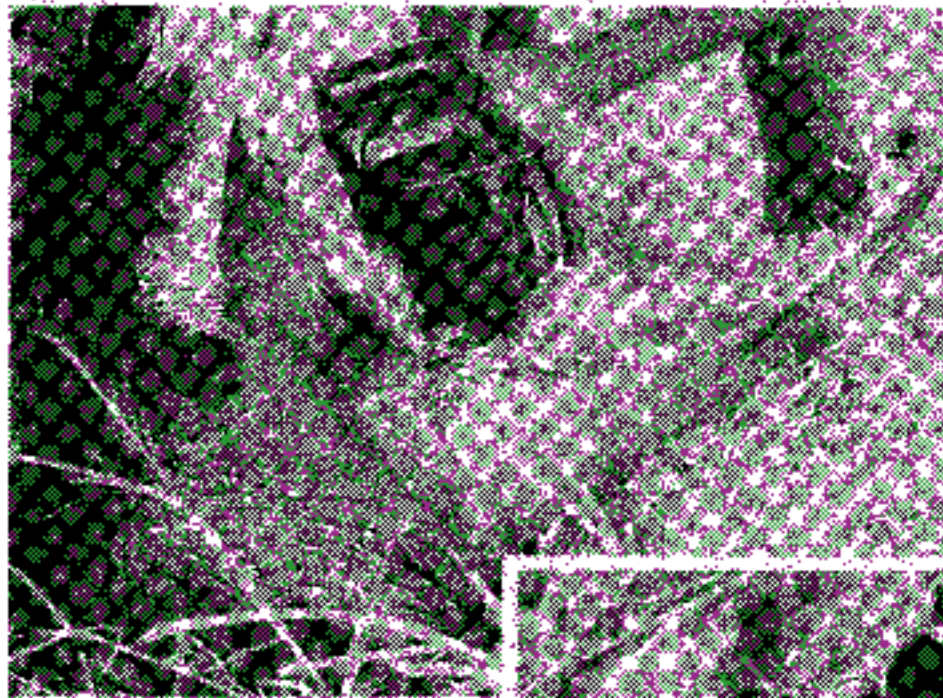
This is the bulk of the expenditure, together with manpower on the ground, led by Mike Kock, the Chief Vet. The ground crews are totally dedicated to their tasks, grossly underpaid and living in very basic conditions in the middle of the bush at strategic locations for tracking the rhinos. These men and women are away from home weeks on end, sleeping in the open with very basic hygiene facilities. Game scouts earn as little as \$50 per month, ranging up to \$300 per month for the Wardens! We should not forget this pitiful pay scale!

Their desire to succeed and their good natured spirit, is much to be commended and having spent a little time with them, I urge all our supporters to be as generous as they can in helping fund this vital work.

Based on statistics from the Matusadona, the dehorning costs \$1,000 per animal, and it is hoped that 500 animals will be dehorned, giving an appeal figure of about \$400,000 (with experience, the cost per animal will decrease). There will no doubt be certain variables, but of one thing we can be sure — **DEHORNING IS URGENT AND WILL BE EXPENSIVE.**

WHY DEHORN RHINOS?

Dehorning has traditionally been a controversial topic, and its biological implications are not fully known. But today, in the face of massive poaching, one thing is certain: rhinos with horns end up dead. Their chances of survival are far greater once the horns have been removed. With the black rhino plunging towards extinction in the wild, the biological debate has been temporarily suspended in favour of imme-



diately dehorning. Provided the dehorning is widely publicised, there will be no incentive for poachers to kill the dehorned animals.

Previous experience includes the dehorning of black rhinos in Namibia, and of white rhinos in Zimbabwe's Hwange National Park, and results to date have been encouraging. Two dehorned white rhinos were killed in Hwange, but this seems to have been a "last try" before the gang left the park without making any further kills.

What has emerged, however, are large differences in costs between previous exercises and the recent Matusadona project. Namibian rhinos live in open, semi-desert habitats and are therefore easy to locate. White rhinos are found in groups. But in Matusadona — which is typical of most Zimbabwean habitats — the solitary black rhinos shelter in dense vegetation, making them extremely difficult to locate. This pushed the cost up from a first estimate of \$400 per animal to over \$1,000 per animal — and similar costs can be expected elsewhere in Zimbabwe. Hence the non-government organisations' high target figure of \$400,000 to cover the programme.

The initial dehorning programme in the Matusadona found only 16 rhinos, from an estimated population of some 200 about

3 years ago i.e. 85% had succumbed to the poacher's bullet. A mother and a calf were shot by Zambians just 10 minutes from the dehorning operation, and two other recently dehorned rhinos were shot the following week! Such is the desperation of the poachers. A month later a further 8 rhinos were located, and these have now been dehorned.

In neighbouring Chete Safari Area, the results were just as disappointing and only 20 have been located (10 for Australia?) from a once healthy population.

Dehorning of both white and black rhinos in Hwange National Park has been under way since late July and 3 poachers have recently been killed near the dehorning scene, and one large dehorned bull has been shot and a mere 3 inches of horn hacked from its skull together with its radio collar which had been fitted for monitoring purposes.

Dehorning is now continuing in the Zambezi Valley and Chizarira/Chirisa area. Every effort is being made for this programme to go without a hitch, but funds are needed to help finance this historic conservation move. SAVE has recently donated \$10,000 for helicopter hire.

NATIONAL RHINO DAY

"Heritage or History?"

The various conservation organisations in Harare are organising a National Rhino Day for Saturday 7 November 1992, in which a large procession of floats will parade through the streets of Harare. These will have been designed by Harare school children, and prizes will be awarded to the best entries.

SAVE's contribution is to organise a series of petitions to President Mugabe, requesting urgent support be given by the Zimbabwe Government to protect their endangered wildlife. Petition forms are available from your local office.

RHINOS FOR AUSTRALIA

A Sydney-based film crew has been in Zimbabwe for six weeks filming "Rhino Rescue". Many hours of great footage have been filmed, showing the whole dehorning process, the capture from Chete Safari Area for Australia, and their subsequent transfer to holding pens on the outskirts of Harare. Unfortunately, the veterinary tests required by the Australian Quarantine Department have shown these animals to be carrying a parasite, theileria, and this is unacceptable to the Australian authorities. Hence, these 10 rhinos are "in limbo" for the present, and their future will be decided in the next month.

Hopefully, they can be transported to Cocos Island for two months quarantine and subsequently to Western Plains Zoo, Dubbo, to start their new life as part of the captive breeding programme currently being organised in Zimbabwe, U.S.A. and Australia.
