aspects obviously are more flexible than previously thought, e.g. the caste system among non-reproducing members seems to be less strictly size-dependant, but the basic facts of eusociality remain. Several chapters include broad comparisons with eusocial insects, birds and communally breeding mammals.

The book is very helpful both for curatorial staff planning to keep these animals and for educators - the latter even if they do not have these fascinating creatures in their collection

Captive Rhinos of all times

The Rhinoceros in captivity, SPB Acad. Publ., The Hague 1998, iv + 409pp, ISBN 90-5103-134-3, at US 128,-,

L.C. "Kees" Rookmaaker, now curator of the Rhino Museum at Melkrivier, Northern Province. South Africa. has published an enomously informative book on all thinos every reported to be kept in human care (or noglect), since the Roman and Chinese imperial times of 2000 years ago: The book is a source of previously unknown data, by including all reports of animals kept by dealers, circusses and private collectors, statistics on longevity, age/sex distribution, birth records, monthly distribution of births, percentage of females giving single and multiple births, chronological and geographical lists of collections holding each species, countries/areas of origin, etc. The book is illustrated with b/w pictures of live animals and museum specimens, logos of zoos with thino motives, contemporary drawings/etchings/posters from early and recent times, and facsimile copies of original descriptions. The photographs not only show animals, but also a variety of enclosure types and husbandry situations (I found, e.g., a very interesting picture of a Black thino feeding peacefully with a group of obviously impala at Taipeh Zoo). The book includes 14 pp of references (in very tiny letters, with appr. 50 references printed per page)

A must for every rhinophyle, zoo history enthusiast and studbook collector

Feeding Ecology of Baboons

Feeding for Survival (Stuart Altmann, Chicago Univ.Press, 622 pp,1998,

(55,95 for hard bound copy)

is an extracordinarily detailed account of foraging behaviour nutritional intake and survival of 11 yearling Yellow baboons (P. cynocephalus) at Amboseli NP, Kenya. Altmann not only collected data on dietary composition but also compares these real diets to values of nutrient, vitamin, mineral and toxin content as well as to theoretical values for ideal diets. The astonishing result is that, more than anything else, diet and foraging at 1 year's age are predictors for later survival and reproductive success as adults. This leads to a detailed discussion of contraints on optimal foraging in an electic omnivore.

The book is a rare example of interdisciplinary research in disciplines that not only in the field but also in zoos

tend to be kept separate, and as much a demonstration of the mutual benefits for a coordinated approach.

Publications from South African Veterinary Association

discussing among others the role of handraised/orphaned animals, pathological/epidemiological and yet issues, the role of farmers, land-owners, the media and other members of the public, and establishes minimum; operating guidelines for a rehab centre.

Symposium on African Elephants as Game Ranch Animals

including chapters on boma and fence design, suitability ofelectric fences, several veterinary and pathological chapters; and short-term management of newly captured juveniles; a similar volume on Rhines, with a lot of data on habitat; foraging reproduction and diseases of both African species; including a bibliography; a similar one on Sable antelope, including habitat selection, and feeding, genetic diversity, census techniques, cestrus; cycle and non-surgical removal of embryos, and a sable/roan; bibliography; one on Lions and Leopards, including several chapters onconflicts with humans, social structure, handraising, genetics; several veterinary chapters, and several on the ecological role of these big cats; again a very extensive bibliography
