It all started on the evening of **Tuesday 9 June 1987**. About 180 guests had booked to hear a talk by **Babette Alfieri**, attracted by The Sunday Times caption—“**Poachers' mass slaughter fires charge to save rhino**”. Twelve decided to take action and arranged to meet the following evening at **Warwick Rowell's** townhouse and thus, **Save African Endangered Wildlife Foundation** was formed. And now, **25 years later**, we are one of the leading supporters of rhino conservation in Zimbabwe, and provided **\$485,000** of equipment and project expenses in our last financial year, April 2011/March 2012. In 1995 we changed our name to **SAVE FOUNDATION of Australia** and this year we are changing to **Save African Rhino Foundation**, to more aptly describe our mission.

We were originally called to action by the fact that between 1972 and 1987, **96% of Africa's black rhinos were slaughtered** for their horn, from **65,000 down to 3,500**. In 1987, **Zimbabwe had around 2,000**, South Africa, Kenya and Namibia each had **450** and Tanzania was home to the remaining **150**. Now, 25 years on, it's Namibia and South Africa up near **1,900** each, Kenya at **550**, Zimbabwe with **400** and Tanzania down to less than **100**.

In the same timeframe, the **southern white rhino**, native to South Africa, has grown from **4,000 to around 18,000**, showing that dramatic resurgences can occur with the right management strategies. These rhinos are under heavy siege, **448 killed last year and over 225 so far this year!**

As a matter of interest, the other three rhino species, **Indian, Sumatran and Javan**, have approximately **2,500, 180 and 40** respectively.

Our first patron was **Lord Alistair McAlpine**, and his Perth home, **Bishop's House**, was the lovely venue for our first fundraiser. Since then we have raised more than **\$4,200,000**, the vast majority being used **to preserve Zimbabwe's rhinos**, many of whom would by now have been poached had it not been for our intervention with vital anti-poaching resources.

Celebrated former England captain and dashing batsman, **David Gower**, became our second patron in **1992**, followed by world class golfer, **Nick Price**, formerly from Zimbabwe, in **1993**, and Australia's best selling author, **Bryce Courtenay**, in **1994**. We are thrilled and honoured to have such a distinguished quartet of patrons, and thank you, gentlemen, for adding your names and reputations to our foundation to enhance our credibility.

Throughout the years our main forms of fundraising have been our nearly **annual dinner/auctions**, our **safaris** and our **memberships/donations**. More than **5,200 guests** have attended our 15 dinners, mainly at the **Perth Hyatt Regency**, resulting in more than **\$1,100,000** being raised, mostly through the sale of unique cricket memorabilia.

We have hosted over **320 passengers** on our safaris to **Zimbabwe, Botswana and South Africa**, and our main destinations have been **Imire, Hwange, Victoria Falls, Chobe and the Okavango Delta**, with less frequent visits to **Lake Kariba, Cape Town and Etosha**. Without doubt, these are amazing trips and tremendous value—**two seats still remain for our 1 September departure**.

Our **membership** numbers remain steady in the **low 200s** and we invite you all to **please enrol another member**—thanks. Our thanks also go to so many of you who regularly make a **donation** with your membership renewal or appeals, with particular mention of **Karin Keighley, Bev Poor, Peter Hall and Mike Palmer**. Amongst our most supportive **corporate sponsors** have been **Hunter Hall, REM Systems, Abaxis, Siomar Batteries, Mrs Mac's Pty Ltd and Picasso Print**. ZIMBABWE UPDATE 2012

For 25 years we have been **faithful and dedicated rhino supporters in the National Parks of Zimbabwe**. Since the early nineties there has been a build up of rhinos on private lands too, mainly wildlife conservancies. Massive poaching occurred in the Zambezi valley between 1986 and 2003, resulting in the formation of **four Intensive Protection Zones** in the parks and **seven rhino conservancies** on ranch land. Numbers steadily increased for eight years and then land invasions on some of the private land led to increased wildlife poaching. Various management strategies by the **WWF / Southern Africa Regional Programme Office** in Harare, headed by **Raoul du Toit**, resulted in translocations and consolidations for these rhinos, conducted by Chief Government Wildlife Vet, **Chris Foggin**. The overall result is that a founder population of **136 black rhinos** around the country on private land has now risen to over **350**. Sadly, the numbers in the parks have shown the opposite trend, falling from **110** to a mere **45** today.

For our first 20 years, we have dedicated **75%** of our assistance to National Parks and **25%** to the conservancies, and

for the past five years it has been **65/35**. As we mark our 25th anniversary we are being forced to face the reality of the situation and to **tweak our ratios** by giving greater amounts to the private landowners. Of course, we will still be supporting National Parks and look forward to the opportunity of becoming more involved in their two strongholds, an existing one in the south of the country and a new one that will open up next year in the south-east.

A project that your committee decided to support to a fuller extent, after their visit there in February, is one of the conservancies in the south-east with a healthy rhino population, but with 17 mortalities last year and 13 so far this year. We will be part funders (**\$50,000**) of a new anti-poaching team under the training and coordination of **Bryce Clemence**, one of our trainers in the parks for the past year. His father, **Pete**, will continue to help National Parks, where viable. We see this as a very positive move for rhino protection in Zimbabwe.

At the recent **Rhino Management** meeting in Harare, attended by **Steve Harrison** and myself, we agreed to donate **\$50,000** to rhino operations in three key areas, mainly where white rhinos are found. These funds will be coordinated by two local organisations, **Dambari Wildlife Trust** and **AWARE Trust**, both of whom we've worked with on many occasions.

We would like to thank the **many dedicated people of Zimbabwe who are constantly involved in rhino management and protection**, particularly those who have spent a good number of years in this field, and those with whom we have had a close association. There are **many National Parks' rangers who try very hard in difficult circumstances** with limited resources at their disposal, especially those at the rhino coalface—often with little encouragement to succeed. Thanks to you all.

Amongst the **management and veterinary projects** that we've worked closely with for a number of years, we offer special thanks to **Natasha Anderson, Verity Bowman, Chris Foggin, Lovemore Mungwashu, Dave Strydom, Raoul du Toit, Norman English, Sylvester Ncube, Jackson Kamwi, Mike Ball, Clive Stockil, Israel Ngarira, Stephen Long and Lisa Hywood**.

And now to thank all the other people who played vital roles in making this such a successful evening. To all our item donors—boat owner **Dave Bovell**, artists, **Craig Hilton Barber, Chris Wiles** and **Callum Fairnie**, jeweller **Doris Brinkhaus**, and autograph

Poachers' mass slaughter fires charge to save rhino

FOUR years ago an estimated 60,000 rhino roamed Africa — now there are 4000.

The slaughter of these magnificent beasts by poachers for their horn and the males' penis has been a major problem in

central and southern Africa.

Since 1980, Babette Alfieri has raised \$US350,000 to combat the increasing threat of poachers in this region.

She and a friend have bought anti-poaching equipment, including two light aircraft for aerial reconnaissance,

and a Mercedes truck for transporting animals to protected areas.

Babette is concerned with saving the rhino from extinction. She is working with the Zimbabwe authorities to conserve 750 black rhino.









TRAGIC DEATH OF ANDY SEARLE


It is with great sadness that we report the untimely death of Andy Searle in a helicopter crash on 6 March. He was returning from rhino tracking and mysteriously nose-dived into the ground. Andy was a great all-rounder with National Parks and had served them with distinction for more than 20 years. His last position was as Warden of the game capture unit at Umtsibhi, Hwange National Park. He leaves a widow, Lol, and a four-year old son, Drew.








