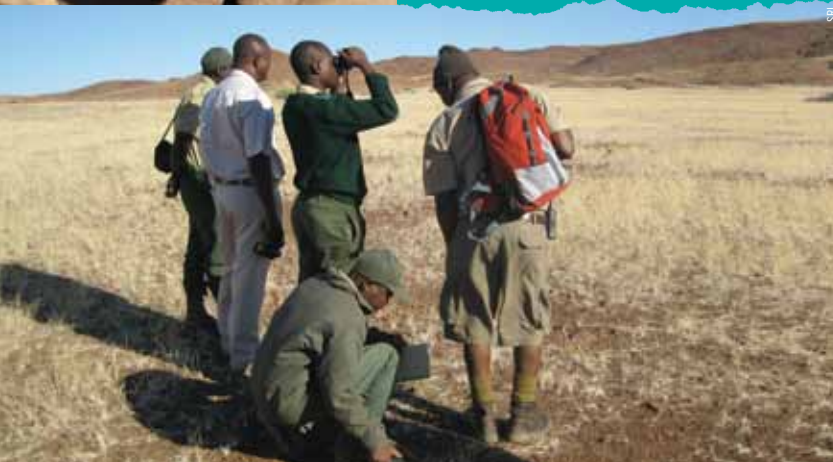

It can sometimes feel a very long way away from our office in central London to the deserts of Namibia or the bushveld of Zimbabwe – but not this year! 
I need to emphasise that these field trips are not 'jollies': we inevitably set off burdened with kit donations, armed with long agendas of items that need discussion, and come back with a whole set of outputs: debrief reports for our Trustees and donors, articles for this magazine, photographs for our picture library,

and the bones of a fundraising proposal and budget to be worked up in more detail when back at our desks.

As well as information gathering, these visits also serve to build much deeper, more open relationships with the field programme managers and their teams. It is so much easier to discuss a problem that has arisen if you've spent 'beer time' around a campfire, or helped dig a vehicle out of a particularly deep and muddy rut. You can 'shorthand' a conversation, without the need for frills and polish, and get to the heart of the matter in hand, without upsetting the long-term relationship.

We also have a responsibility to our donors to ensure that their money is being spent well and wisely. While we don't carry out a full audit and inspect timesheets, we can get a good sense of what is working/not working/delayed/needs tweaking, and have a look and see if the binoculars or laptops we paid for are still there and being used properly. (We've never had a problem like this, but I do know of other cases...)

If you're twitching to get to a land where the bright diamond sand throws its light from the glittering streams, do look up the Africa programmes we support on our website. I've recently added in details of tourist accommodation in the areas where the rhino field programmes work, and although we can't offer you the behind-the-scenes access described in this issue, you can get pretty close!
