TIGER CENSUS IN BARDIA NATIONAL PARK

Bardia National Park, Department of Wildlife Conservation, Department of Forests, World Wildlife Fund for Nature, and National Natural Trust for Nature Conservation has conducted Tiger (*Panthera Tigris*) census in Bardia National Park in mid-western Nepal. Automatic cameras were installed in various 297 locations in the park area to count the tiger. There were 50 tigers found in Bardia National Park in 2015.

GINGER EXPORT DECLINES

The export of ginger (*Zingiber officinale*) to India from Ilam district, eastern Nepal has declined by 62 percent in comparison to the previous year, due to border blockade. The export was only worth NRs 690 million against NRs 3.21 billion. The price of ginger has also decreased by 50 percent in comparison to the last year.

LEOPARD RESCUED FROM KIRTIPUR AND RELEASED

A male leopard (*Panthera pardus*) has been captured from a house where it had been locked in by the owners for safety reasons in Kirtipur, Central Nepal. Technicians and veterinarians from the Central Zoo contained the wild cat and freed it in a forest north of Kathmandu.

RHINOS RADIO-COLLARED IN BARDIA

The Department of National Parks and Wildlife Conservation (DNPWC), National Trust for Nature Conservation, WWF Nepal and local communities have collared two more rhinos (*Rhinoceros unicornis*) from Bardia National Park, mid-western Nepal with radio transmitters. They were collared to track their movements so as to provide information regarding the behavior and habitat of the endangered animal.

RHINO POACHING AT KAZIRANGA NATIONAL PARK

Kaziranga National Park in Assam, north eastern India has lost a second rhino (*Rhino cerotidae*) to poachers within a span of two weeks. Forest guards found the carcass of the rhino with its horn removed. The rate of Rhino poaching has been increasing over the years at Kaziranga forest. Last year alone, 15 rhinos were poached for their horns.

TIBET GEOTHERMAL ENERGY POSSESSES POTENTIAL TO REPLACE COAL ENERGY

China claimed that the geothermal energy found in Tibet is most likely to replace the coal in energy consumption. The survey reveals that Tibet Autonomous region alone has 672 geothermal sites that can combine to produce 800,000 kilowatts. This total energy resource is equivalent to 853 billion tones of standard coal.
