### RHINO KEEPER WORKSHOP IN DENVER

From 6 to 11 August I was happy to attend the bi-annual workshop organized by the International Rhino Keepers Association. Attended by some 150 delegates, it provided a platform to discuss all kinds of issues relating to rhino management in captive facilities as well as rhino conservation in Asia and Africa. Excursions took us to the zoos in Denver and Colorado Springs, as well as the USFW Arsenal in Denver where confiscated parts of endangered species are stored and distributed. I am sure we all look forward to the next meeting in 2019.

### ZOOLOGICAL ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA

The Board of <u>ZAA</u> has invited the RRC to share its commitment as a Conservation Partner. The ZAA promotes responsible ownership, management, conservation, and propagation of animals in both privately funded and publicly funded facilities through professional standards in husbandry, animal care, safety and ethics.



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### THE KILLING OF A ZOO RHINO

On 7 March 2017 the world ws shocked to hear about the killing of a white rhino "Vince" in the Thoiry zoo, France. Poachers had entered the enclosure, killed the animal and sawn off the horns. In previous years, there had been a number of (attempted) thefts of rhino horns from museums. But the killing of a live animal in a well-run zoo was as unexpected as unacceptable. Many zoos and museums have now reviewed their security measures to protect their rhino horn from danger.

It has been argued that rhino horn thieves and rhino poachers could use the internet to select their next targets. While this is true, most museum specimens were stolen from collections of which information about their holdings would not have been found online. At the same time, most zoos and similar facilities want to attract visitors and often have at least a general list of species on their websites. It will remain a hard task to decide which information might potentially endanger rhinos or their products while still attracting visitors to our establishments. The RRC will continue to monitor the situation.

### THE MAIN QUESTION: WHAT WILL HAPPEN TO CONSERVATION HISTORY

This leads to a serious question. The IUCN/SSC Specialist Groups for African and for Asian rhinos provide very little data of rhino stock in the range states, often only releasing country-wide estimates or other general information. This is done to avoid attracting the attention of potential poachers to existing populations. There certainly appears to be good reason for this procedure.

There is however a flipside to this. It is assumed that much information is gathered by the specialist groups and similar bodies, which is not released in any published form. It would seem logical that at some point this information becomes so old and dated that it can no longer be a threat to the remaining animals. But where would anybody be able to find this out-of-date information, which could help reconstruct conservation history and historical distribution.

As far as I am aware, neither the AfRSG nor the AsRSG keep formal archives. Where would the next generation of scientists and conservationists in the year 2075 go to explore what happened in our lifetime? There would be no published data. And maybe there will be no manuscript data either.

We may be in danger to lose the history of an entire era in conservation.

I would be interested to hear if this problem has been adressed for any other endangered species.

### AUCTION OF RHINO HORN IN SOUTH AFRICA

Trade in rhino horn was made legal within South Africa, but any international trade governed by CITES remains illegal. One wonders why anybody in South Africa would want to buy a piece of rhino horn – unless of course it is ultimately destined to illegal international trade. The shipment of the sold items should be carefully monitored.

### FLOODING IN INDIA AND NEPAL



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


