PRINCE'S TOUR.

HIS FIRST RHINOCEROS.

BATACCA, December 20.—After Sunday's rest the Prince of Wales and his staff enjoyed an excellent day's sport yesterday, the total bag being three rhinoceroses, four tigers, one leopard, and one black bear.

The Prince shot his first rhinoceros yesterday, which turned out to be a very fine specimen. A tiger cub was also caught alive.

His Royal Highness received as presents, at the Nepal Durbar a number of live animals, including a black leopard, Himalayan deer, and black bear, Tibetan dogs and goats, horned sheep, a rhinoceros calf, a baby elephant, and numerous birds mainly found in the Nepal forest.

The presents were offered with great ceremony by the Prime Minister, strictly according to the old and time-honoured custom of the country. It is an immemorial practice that no guest may leave the territory without receiving some present.

The Prince is immensely pleased with the animals, which, it is understood, he will present to the London Zoo.

His Royal Highness thanked the Maharajah for the great courtesy shown to him.—*Press Association.*
