the form of the bill in the herons was derivative.

SKULL OF THE LADO RHINOCEROS.

I am indebted to Sir E. G. Loder for directing my attention to a new character by which the skull of the Lado, or northern, race of the white rhincoreors may be distinguished from that of the typical southern form of the species. In the latter the profile of the skull is very sinuous, so that the creet of the

occiput rises high above the line of the frontal region; while the same creat overlangs only to a slight degree the occipital condyles, by which the skull articulates with the first vertebra. On the other hand, in the Lado race the profile is straighter and the occipital crest lower, but the latter largely overhanges the occipital condyles, thus giving a much more elongated appearance to the whole skull.
