BASLE BRED RHINO

On the 14th September, 1956 a baby was born to the Indian rhinos. (Rhinoceros unicornis) — a very sensational birth for it is the FIRST one to have occured in a Zoo.

The Indian rhinos, "Gadadhar" and "Joymothi" came to the Basle Zoo (Switzerland) in 1951 and 1952, having been imported by Mr. Peter Ryhiner the collector from the Kaziranga Game Sanctuary of Assam. Both animals were young and lived together very peacefully.

Since the Spring of 1956 their keeper — Paul Waldner — thought it was obvious that Joymothi was pregnant. The development of the embryo was easily followed and the movements in the mother's body were clearly visible.

The birth on the 14th September was carefully watched and all particulars were photographed. The mother took excellent care of her baby, a well-formed male weighing 60.5 kilograms at birth. The little fellow (which is called "Rudra") was very calm and was not afraid of people.

One hour after birth the baby went to stand and looked for the nipples in order to take his first feed. On the second day he walked together with his mother in the barless enclosure of the Rhino-Elephant House which was built in 1953.
