RHINO ARK OBJECTIVES

Rhino Ark seeks solutions to the challenges facing the mountain forest ecosystems of Kenya, also known as the water towers. More specifically, Rhino Ark aims to:

- (i) Protect Kenya's mountain forests, other threatened habitats and their rich biodiversity;
- (ii) Engage and educate adjacent communities in conservation;
- (iii) Secure the connectivity between mountain forests and other threatened wildlife habitats;
- (iv) Establish sustainable financing mechanisms for the conservation of mountain forests and other threatened wildlife habitats;
- (v) Advocate nationally and internationally for the conservation of the mountain forests and other threatened habitats, their wildlife and their ecological functions; and,
- (vi) Use science to assess the impacts of, and review conservation interventions.

2022 has been a year of remarkable recovery in Rhino Ark's financial situation following the drawn-out impacts of COVID-19. This recovery has enabled a steady expansion of our programme of work.

Indeed, the total funding contribution towards our conservation work increased more than fourfold from KES 92.61 million in the financial year 2020-21 to KES 427.89 million in the financial year 2021-22 (including KES 156 million from the Rhino Charge). This shows the exemplary resilience of the Trust thanks to our broad community of partners and supporters in Kenya and overseas. This is also attributed to the rigorous fundraising efforts by the Rhino Ark management team, supported by the Rhino Ark UK Fundraising Committee. Rhino Ark USA has recently strengthened its fundraising capability with the hiring of a professional fundraiser who will primarily focus on the US market.

As announced earlier in the year, the Kakamega Forest Fencing and Conservation Project is ON. With the support of the Government of Japan through the United Nations Development Programme, fence materials to build Phase I (15km) of the 117km long Kakamega Forest Electric Fence have been procured and delivered to Kakamega. Phase I will take 3 months to complete once construction work commences, and preparations are on-going. Concurrently, work on the Mt. Kenya Electric Fence is progressing well with 37 kilometres of the 60 kilometres of the new fence in Nyeri County already built.

The Ngong Road Forest Sanctuary, another vulnerable ecosystem, has recently been added to the five ecosystems (Mt. Kenya, Aberdare Range, Mt. Eburu, South Western Mau and Kakamega) in Rhino Ark's conservation portfolio. Rhino Ark will implement a fencing and conservation programme in Ngong Road Forest Sanctuary together with Kenya Forest Service, the Ngong Road Forest CFA and other partners. This 695.3 hectare urban forest located in the heart of Nairobi Capital City has the potential to become a key recreational destination for city dwellers, similar to Karura Forest.

Complementary to our forest conservation work, Rhino Ark is working on the conservation of critically endangered species: in particular the black rhino and the mountain bongo antelope. Preparations are progressing well for a future re-introduction of the bongo in Ragati Forest, Mt. Kenya, with funding from the Wilder Institute/Calgary Zoo. In addition, Rhino Ark, together with KWS, has secured some initial funding to enhance the security of the population of black rhinos in the Aberdares.



CARBON NEUTRAL EVENT

Rhino Ark fully offsets the event's carbon footprint by purchasing Certified Emission Reductions (CERs) which go towards UNFCCC certified projects that reduce, avoid or remove greenhouse gas emissions from the atmosphere.

VOLUNTEER-RUN

The Rhino Charge is primarily run by volunteers. The Main Organising Committee consists of 11 members. They plan the event year-round and spend up to 2 weeks on site before and after the Charge. At the event itself, another 60+ volunteer officials give their time and expertise to ensure the smooth running of the event. Volunteers not only donate time, but considerable resources which help reduce the overall costs of the event.

Since the Rhino Charge is the guest of the host community, the Main Organising Committee places a lot of importance on, and devotes much of its time to, building good relations with the community involved. They also spend time finding and designing the route, plus planning how to provide good camping for up to 3,000 people, including planning water provision, medical facilities, airstrips and other key parts of the event.

4-5 AIRCRAFT



Search and Rescue at the venue typically consists of:

- 4-5 Aircraft including fixed wing planes, helicopters and gyrocopters,
- 4-5 Cars in strategic positions,
- 1 Team @ HQ monitoring positions of cars and co-ordinating with S&R Team over the radio.

The S&R team remains on duty until all people have been safely accounted for and recovered. At Nannapa Conservancy, the S&R team ended their shift at 4am in the morning after the Charge. Stuck, lost or broken vehicles are often recovered the next day.





RHINO ARK KENYA CHARITABLE TRUST NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below:

(a) Basis of Preparation

The financial statements summarise the transactions of the Trust and deal with the net assets at the disposal of the Directors. The financial statements are presented in Kenya Shillings (KES), which is the Trust's functional and presentation currency.

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost basis of accounting except where otherwise stated in the accounting policies below.

(b) Income Recognition

Donations and Rhino Charge collections are recognised on receipt.

Investment income is recognised on accrual basis.

(c) Property and Equipment

Items of property and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is charged on the straight line basis over the estimated useful lives of the assets.

The annual depreciation rates in use are:

Motor vehicles	25.0%
Furniture and fittings	12.5%
Computers	33.3%
Office equipment	12.5%

(d) Foreign Currency Transactions

Transactions during the year are converted into Kenya Shillings at the rates ruling at the transaction dates. Assets and liabilities at the reporting date, which are expressed in foreign currencies, are translated at the rates ruling at that date. The resulting differences from conversion and translation are dealt with in the income and expenditure account.

(e) Financial Instruments

A financial instrument is a contract that gives rise to both a financial asset of one enterprise and a financial liability of another enterprise. The financial instruments held by the Trust are investments in the money market, trade and other receivables, bank balances and cash and trade and other payables.

All the financial instruments held by the Trust are accounted for on an amortised cost basis.

(f) Receivables

Receivables are stated at nominal value, less provision for any amounts considered irrecoverable.

(g) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand and short term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less.

(h) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements requires that management makes estimates and assumptions that affect amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from these estimates. The more significant estimation process is related to the determination of provision for doubtful debts. Although some variability is inherent in these estimates, management believes that the amounts provided are adequate.

(i) Investments

Investments are held in the money market with Old Mutual and Britam Asset Managers. Interest is earned on a monthly basis from these placements and rolled over as principal.

(j) Payables

Payables are stated at nominal value.

The year 2021-2022 has been marked by a remarkable recovery of Rhino Ark's financial situation and an expansion of our programme of work. Indeed, the total contribution towards our conservation work increased more than fourfold from KES 92.61 million in 2020-2021 to KES 427.89 million in 2020-2021.

It has also been tinged with sadness at the loss of two conservation legends. Charles Njonjo, one of our Patrons and an ardent conservationist, and Richard Leakey, a leading figure in the fight against wildlife crime and a great supporter of Rhino Ark's work, both passed on at the start of the year.

Overall funds 2021/22

The total funds raised during the financial year under review were KES 427.89 million. This included in-cash donations amounting to KES 157.77 million (2021: KES 63.29 million) from Rhino Charge, Corporates and individuals. In-kind donations amounting to KES 270.12 million were received from international organisations, Government, a variety of corporations, individuals and volunteers.

KWS covered the costs of the personnel maintaining the 400 kilometres Aberdare Fence and the existing 230 kilometres Mt. Kenya Fence, whilst Kenya Forest Service (KFS) covered similar costs for the 43.3 kilometres Eburu Fence. These contributions amounted to KES 26.62 million.

Support from Corporate and Conservation Entities

We received the following important contributions from a number of key supporters:

- M-Pesa Foundation donated KES 2.985 million for the maintenance of the Eburu Fence;

- Rare Species Conservatory Foundation donated USD 47,000 in (KES 5.19 million) support of the conservation of the Mountain Bongo antelope;
- Calgary Zoo donated KES 3.89 million in support of forest conservation and community livelihoods towards the recovery of the Mountain Bongo antelope;
- Wildlife Conservation Society donated USD 25,000 (KES 2.63 million) for addressing human-wildlife conflict (building of elephant grids) in the Imenti forest;
- Total Energies donated KES 0.63 million in fuel credit in support of the Rhino Charge 2021 event;
- Eburu Rafiki donated KES 535,325 in support of grassroots education outreach. This includes funds from the Millard Family Foundation, The Safari Collection and several other donors;
- IDH Sustainable Trade Initiative (IDH) donated Euro 8,364 (KES 1.072 million) for the activities at South Western Mau Forest Reserve;
- Tusk Trust Limited donating GBP 21,645 (KES 3.30 million for activities at AJSU protecting the Aberdare ecosystem;
- Elephant Cooperation donated USD 50,000 (KES 5.68 million) for building an elephant underpass on the Nanyuki-Meru highway.

Mau Eburu Project

Forest protection

Rhino Ark continues to support the maintenance of the Eburu electric fence and forest protection. We played a pivotal role in combatting the severe forest fires that broke out during the dry season at the beginning of 2022. Over 500 hectares of forest were ravaged by various fires before being contained. Thanks to funding from Tusk Trust; Rhino Ark was able to equip and train a community brigade of 22 firefighters with state-of-the-art fire equipment and clothing.

Under the Rhino Ark/Calgary Zoo partnership, a total of 194 days of forest security patrols were carried out by community scouts in collaboration with KFS and KWS rangers. These patrols recovered 105 snares, destroyed 11 illegal charcoal kilns and made 11 arrests. Also under this framework, a total of 16 trap cameras were maintained in the forest to collect data on wildlife species distribution.

Community livelihoods

Rhino Ark supports the ongoing schools' conservation education programme is ongoing with 32 schools participating. The programme received a major endorsement by the Ministry of Education at the annual Curriculum Implementation Committee meeting in January 2022, with the Quality Assurance Office committing to participate in the programme. The schools tree nurseries programme expanded with the establishment of a model nursery at Kahuho Secondary School. The nursery is maintained by pupils.

In terms of sustainable energy initiatives, Rhino Ark trained and assisted 10 farmers to access a discounted installation rate to implement the use of biogas in the ecosystem.

Under the Rhino Ark/Calgary Zoo partnership, the beekeeping programme has been enhanced. Eburu beekeepers have been supported to register a cooperative – the Eburu Natural Forest Honey Cooperative Society Limited, and received training on beehive management. The Cooperative now has 60 active members. The Community Forest Association (CFA) has been supported to strengthen its governance capacity and boost its membership, with 681 new members recruited. Support for ecotourism initiatives has been provided through construction of a CFA office at the Eburu Forest station, sponsorship of the installation of forest trail visitor signage; and the organisation of 24 monthly training sessions for Community Conservation Champions on birding and medicinal plant identification.

South Western Mau Project

Rhino Ark's programme in South Western Mau remains centred on three key pillars: Protection, Restoration and Community livelihoods.

Restoration

In 2021, Rhino Ark commenced a 3-year partnership with Platinum Credit (a subsidiary of the Platcorp Holdings Company) to rehabilitate 10 hectares of degraded forest at the Kapkembu forest outpost in collaboration with Kenya Forest Services. 16,000 seedlings were planted and the site micro-fenced and placed under active maintenance. The site is part of the upper catchment for the Mara River system. Following the success of this rehabilitation work, Platinum expanded their support with a commitment to rehabilitate a further 40 hectares of forest in 2022. The new

site selected is at Tirigoi, approximately 1.5 kilometres from the Kapkembu site. The Kapkembu and Tirigoi sites will add to the 40 hectares of Rhino Ark rehabilitated forest in Kipkoris that we are maintaining.

Rhino Ark expresses its sincere gratitude to Platinum Credit Ltd.

Protection of the Forest

During the period, Rhino Ark supported and participated in 22 forest patrols along various trails known to be channels for illegal activities. The patrols, undertaken in collaboration with forest rangers and community conservation champions - recovered 38 snares (two of which contained snared animals), 32 logs and destroyed 10 charcoal kilns.

Community livelihoods

Rhino Ark continues to support community livelihood activities. The field team is providing technical support to community members engaged in beekeeping. Within the reporting period, 8 new tree nurseries were established, with a total of 24,000 seedlings produced. The newly established nurseries complement a further 20 nurseries established by forest adjacent communities with technical support from Rhino Ark. The community conservation outreach programme is ongoing, which includes a conservation education initiative in 46 local schools. The field team is supplemented by a team of 9 volunteer Community Conservation Champions to enhance outreach and community engagement.

Mt. Kenya fencing project

A 60-kilometre-long phase of the Mt Kenya solar electric fence was launched in November 2021. This phase has been implemented through a public-private partnership between the Upper Tana Catchment Natural Resources Management Project, Kenya Wildlife Service, Kenya Forest Service, Rhino Ark Kenya Charitable Trust and Mount Kenya Trust. Support has also been received from the Kenya Pipeline Company and the Fresno Chaffee Zoo (USA).

This activity is a continuation of the Mt. Kenya electric fence programme through which 230 kilometres of fence as well as 30 kilometres of low fence with outriggers have already been constructed with support from various stakeholders.

The Imenti Forest in the northeast of Mount Kenya, has proved to be one of the most challenging forest areas fenced by Rhino Ark to date due to

elephant movement and fence breakage. To address these challenges, Rhino Ark completed the construction of two elephant grids and is now preparing to build an additional 4 elephant grids. Rhino Ark has also started the construction process of a new wildlife underpass on the Nanyuki-Meru highway where the highway crosses the Imenti Forest. These add to the 30 kilometres of double fences and the two one-way automatic elephant gates already built in the same area. This forest has possibly one of the highest concentrations of applied technology to enable elephant movement and human development side by side.

The Mount Kenya Wildlife Conservancy (MKWC) has launched the 800-acre Mawingu Mountain Bongo Sanctuary. The sanctuary represents a key milestone in the breeding and rewilding process of the bongo antelope towards its reintroduction in indigenous forest habitat such as the Ragati, Eburu and Mau Forests.

As part of its forest restoration programme, Rhino Ark planted an additional 5,500 indigenous trees in Gathiuru Forest, in conjunction with Mount Kenya Conservation Forum, KFS and Gathiuru Forest Association.

Aberdares ecosystem

Protecting the precious but fragile ecosystem of the Aberdares needs constant fence maintenance to deter poachers, illegal loggers, charcoal burners and minimise forest encroachment, and also serves the key function of protecting forest-adjacent communities from marauding wildlife. Rhino Ark continued financing the maintenance of the 400-km-long Aberdare fence, as a priority area.

To this end, Rhino Ark signed an agreement with the IUCN under the EU - funded BIOPAMA Rapid Response Grant, to help maintain the Aberdare Electric Fence and the organisation of the Aberdare Fence Relay Run.

Rhino Ark secured a third grant from Tusk Trust in support of community scout operations as part of the Aberdare Joint Surveillance Unit (AJSU). Fully trained and equipped, AJSU carries out many tasks; including, forest patrols, detection of illegal activities, arrests, destruction of charcoal kilns and marijuana crops, and removal of snares and traps. AJSU also conducts regular assessment of the status of the 400-kilometre-long fence around the Aberdare ecosystem.

Rhino Ark, in partnership with Challenge Aid, a UK-based charitable trust - donated textbooks and feminine hygiene products to schools adjacent to the Aberdare Electric Fence. The donations are part of an ongoing project implemented by both partners under the banner of 'School of Hope'.

Wildfires have been a major concern in the Northern Aberdares. During one period of wildfires, at least 700 hectares alone of moorlands vegetation burned within the Aberdare National Park and adjacent Forest Reserve. The recent investment in capacity building with firefighters in terms of equipment and training within Rhino Ark, Mount Kenya Trust, KFS and KWS - has greatly assisted in tackling these fires.

Bongo Surveillance Project (BSP)

Rhino Ark remains a key partner and supporter of the Bongo Surveillance Project, raising the bulk project funding and seconding a conservation education officer to the initiative.

During the course of the reporting year USD 47,000 was received from the Rare Species Conservatory Foundation. These funds have been earmarked for the collection of vital information about the Bongo, security patrols, the removal of snares and spear traps, as well as for the dynamic Bongo wildlife school outreach programmes under BSP.

A Thousand Thank-yous

We wish to extend our sincere thanks to each and every one of our supporters, partners and friends, whose dedication and commitment has been vital to our continued success in the conservation of Kenya's water towers.

Rhino Ark received KES 5 million from His Excellency, Uhuru Kenyatta, President of the Republic of Kenya. I thank him for his generous support to our vital conservation work for Kenya's water towers.

I wish to thank the Rhino Charge Committee and all the volunteers for all their hard work and dedication.

MAU EBURU ECOSYSTEM

WATER TROUGH SERVING WILDLIFE

As part of securing the wildlife corridor between Eburu Forest and Lake Naivasha, a water point was established in the eastern part of Eburu Forest, near the two wildlife gates erected along the Eburu Forest perimeter electric fence.

The purpose of the water point is to enable wildlife to live in the forest and consequently reduce wildlife pressure on the lakeshores and the riparian ranches.

The water point, fed by a steam jet, has been designed to accommodate large mammals, as well as small animals and birds.

FENCE INSPECTION AND MAINTENANCE

In November, the Eburu Forest Fence Technical Committee team inspected the fence at Mukuru Wa Nyatoru in Kahuro zone. Fence inspection is a critical part of maintenance as it helps with the prevention of any unwanted objects coming into contact with the fence. Using voltage meters ensures that the voltage in the wires is to standard.

FOREST PATROLS

Forest patrols are conducted regularly by the Rhino Ark community tracker teams who work closely with the Kenya Forest Service and Kenya Wildlife Service in Eburu Forest to keep mountain forests clear of snares and poachers.

The primary purpose of these patrols in Kenya's mountain ecosystems is to maintain the security of these protected areas, to act as a crime deterrent, and to provide a platform for government and community forest teams to work together.

EBURU FENCE BENEFITTING FARMERS

In Eburu Forest, farmers with land at the forest edge could not farm their land, some opting instead to lease land further away due to the heavy losses caused by wildlife. After completion of the 43.3km Eburu fence, this situation has changed and land values for forest adjacent farms have dramatically increased, in some cases by over 600%.

These farmers are now assured of their harvests and can plan and invest

appropriately. This has directly translated into increasing economic potential, helping farmers to earn more from their farms. The collaborative multi-stakeholder frameworks established by Rhino Ark to maintain fences also double up as fora to network communities with a pool of experts and technical resources that support their livelihood programmes.

These fora have enabled local communities build a rapport with

resourceful partners. They have facilitated support for community water projects, on-farm training and capacity building in activities as diverse as establishing biogas systems, fruit farming, ecotourism and bio enterprise, among others. This network is helping communities diversify their income bases and utilise their farms more effectively.

EBURU FOREST MANAGEMENT STRATEGY

A 3-day plenary workshop on the Eburu Forest took place in October 2022 at the Kenya Forest Service (KFS) offices in Nakuru. Community, government, non-governmental organisations (NGO),

and private stakeholders came together to discuss persistent challenges for the isolated ecosystem. Fruitful discussions on issues across the three days led the 40 participants to a constructive action plan going forward.

Destruction of forest ecosystems causes 11% of global greenhouse gas emissions since trees store carbon which is released when they are cleared or burnt.

TRAP CAMERAS OF IMPORTANCE IN EBURU


As human threats continue to impact natural habitats, there is an increasing need to regularly monitor the trends in large vertebrate populations. Conservation efforts must be directed appropriately, but field work necessary for data collection is often limited by time and availability of people.

Camera traps are used as an efficient method to ensure continuous sampling and to work in difficult-to-access areas. The camera trap has revolutionised wildlife research and conservation, enabling scientists to collect photographic evidence of rarely seen and often globally endangered species, with little expense, relative ease, and minimal disturbance to wildlife.

The Rhino Ark / Calgary Zoo Mountain Forest Conservation Partnership uses remote-sensing camera traps to non-invasively study wildlife presence and prevalence across the ecosystem.

FOREST FIREFIGHTING TRAINING IN NAIVASHA

In October 2022, Rhino Ark commenced a 5-day forest fire fighting training programme for our 22 member Community Fire Brigade at Eburu Forest. The trainees learned about how to fight forest fires in both classroom and practical sessions, led by Steve Alderson of Working On Fire, South Africa, translated by Joseph Muchenduh of Eburu Centre, just outside of Eburu Forest. On the final day of the 5-day programme, participants were given the ultimate test - to work in teams to extinguish large fires set up deliberately for the training activity.

We have also procured high quality equipment for our team to use in training and to combat forest fires. On average, Kenya experiences 78 forest fires annually. Of these fires, 40% are classified as arson, 20% are caused by negligence and carelessness, and 40% are due to unknown causes.

SOUTH WESTERN MAU ECOSYSTEM

DARWIN INITIATIVE SUPPORTS FOREST REHABILITATION

Rhino Ark's ongoing forest rehabilitation programme continues apace with the addition of a 30 hectare site at Korabariet. The site lies at the border of Kericho and Nakuru counties. The area experienced heavy degradation, illegal logging, and encroachment in the past. It is a long-term engagement that will see the organisation introduce conservation outreach programmes to sensitise forest-adjacent communities on conservation issues.

The rehabilitation of the Korabariet site is supported by Darwin Initiative following the recent donation to the organisation to carry out its conservation projects. The vulnerable

wetlands are critical to the area as they contribute to provide the upper catchment of the Sondu Miriu River system.

The South Western Mau forest impacts several rivers in Kenya including the Seretot River, which forms part of the upper catchment of the Sondu Miriu River system.

The rehabilitation and planting of 33,000 trees commenced on 4 November 2022 with the key participation of sixty students from both Korabariet primary and secondary schools, the CFA, local government administration, tea zone officials, Ministry of Health represented by Korabariet dispensary,

the Kenya Police Service led by OCS in charge, faith-based organisations, South Western Mau Conservation Champions, Kenya Forest Service and Rhino Ark Kenya Charitable Trust.

Thanks to the Darwin Initiative for supporting the rehabilitation work at Korabariet. The Darwin Initiative is a UK government grants scheme that helps to protect biodiversity and the natural environment through locally based projects worldwide. Its support will span a critical 3-year period necessary to nurture the seedlings, to survive.

VULNERABLE WETLANDS OF SOUTH WESTERN MAU

The wetlands of South Western Mau are beautiful but vulnerable areas much in need of protection.

The Rhino Ark forest rehabilitation activities ensure that vulnerable water sources are protected. This site in South Western Mau is an example of an area that will benefit from this effort.

PLATINUM CREDIT PARTNERING WITH RHINO ARK TO REHABILITATE SOUTH WESTERN MAU

Platinum Credit Ltd. has partnered with Rhino Ark Kenya to support the rehabilitation of the South Western Mau Forest. They have undertaken to rehabilitate 40 hectares of indigenous forest at Tirigoi ridge, which is part of Ndoinet Forest Station.

This follows the recent donation of KES 5.5 Million (USD 50,000) towards the same project from Platcorp Foundation.

South Western Mau forest impacts several rivers in Kenya including the Mara

ecosystem, which forms part of the upper catchment of the Mara River system. Tirigoi suffered heavy forest degradation up to 2009 due to encroachment. The once prime indigenous forest had been decimated and turned into farmlands and homes.

On 22 June 2022, the journey towards the rehabilitation of Tirigoi commenced with the planting of 44,000 seedlings. Key stakeholders participated including local community representatives, CBO

members, CFA members, Kenya Police service, faith based organisations, Conservation Champions, local government administration from 5 zones, Kenya Forest Service and Rhino Ark.

Many thanks to Platcorp Foundation, a subsidiary of the Platcorp Holdings Company - for supporting the rehabilitation work at Tirigoi. Platinum Credit's support will span a critical 3-year period necessary to nurture the seedlings.

RANGERS GEAR PROCURED

With funding support from Save The Rhinos and ForRangers, Rhino Ark has procured forest hiking gear and camping equipment for 15 rangers in the South-Western Mau Forest Reserve.

The gear and equipment will enable rangers from the Kenya Forest Service and Kenya Wildlife Service to carry out extended, multi-day security patrols deep inside the forest. The patrols aim to address illegal human activities detected through the aerial surveillance programme spearheaded by Rhino Ark.

The gear and equipment provided includes jungle boots, gum boots, raincoats, waterproof gloves, backpacks, sleeping bags, torches, first-aid kits, tents and portable stoves. These items, suitable for the cold and wet forest habitat, will enable the ranger teams to safely venture deep into the forest as required.

The items will greatly assist in wildlife and forest protection work by the security teams.


ENDANGERED SPECIES PROTECTION

Rhino Ark is proud to announce that the Mountain Bongo Expert Advisory Committee held its inaugural meeting in October 2022.

The partnership brings together the Bongo Surveillance Project, Mount Kenya Trust, Ragati River Management, The Calgary Zoo, and Rhino Ark. A team of expert national and international advisors has been assembled to provide technical advice on veterinary, re-introduction, and ungulate translocation issues.

TWO NEW ELEPHANT GRIDS CONSTRUCTED IN UPPER IMENTI

With support from the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) and the Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS), two new elephant grids are being constructed in the Upper Imenti Forest. These add to the two elephant grids just completed by Rhino Ark in the Lower Imenti Forest with support from the Wildlife Conservation Society and the Elephant Cooperation.

In total, six elephant grids are planned to be built in the Imenti Forest to prevent elephants from exiting the fenced forest through the roads that cross the fence.

With two one-way automatic elephant gates, three elephant underpasses, six elephant grids and 54 kilometres of double fences, the Imenti Forest will have the largest concentration of technologies in Kenya aimed at enabling elephants movement while safeguarding the wellbeing of the forest-adjacent communities.

BONGO REINTRODUCTION PROGRAMME

Rhino Ark is conducting research on the critically endangered Mountain Bongo in the south-western part of Mt. Kenya in Nyeri County to ascertain their remnant population and also determine other feasible measures to reverse the decline.

In partnership with The Calgary Zoo and other conservation organisations, we are working together with forest-edge communities to gather this data.

In Kenya, there are estimated to be fewer than 80 Mountain Bongo living in the wild, while another 70 are being bred in captivity at the Mt. Kenya Wildlife Conservancy in Nanyuki.

KENYA PIPELINE COMPANY VISITS MT KENYA FENCE LINE

In September 2022, Rhino Ark hosted a Monitoring and Evaluation team from Kenya Pipeline Company (KPC) led by Bernice Lemedeket, The Foundation Manager. The Team visited the 60km Mt. Kenya solar electric fence that was launched in November 2021 in Nyeri County, Kabaru Forest Station.

In support of the same project, KPC disbursed KES 20 million to help in the fence project that protects one of Kenya's largest water towers. KPC's mandate is to provide efficient and effective means of transporting petroleum products from Mombasa to the hinterland. As such, giving back to the environment and communities is a vitally important part of their work.

Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) is a continuous management function to assess project/programme sustainability used by our partners to check the progress made in achieving expected results and to highlight whether there are any unintended consequences of the project and its activities.

During the visit, KPC planted a commemoration post, took part in direct fence construction, and interacted with victims of human-wildlife conflict.

Mt. Kenya solar powered fence project is a water tower and biodiversity conservation initiative that is being implemented within the framework of a public-private partnership between Rhino Ark Kenya Charitable Trust and its key partners.

So far, 240 kilometres of fence have been built with support from various stakeholders, including; Upper Tana Natural Resources Management Project, Kenya Wildlife Service, Kenya Forest Service, and Mount Kenya Trust.

Once complete, the entire game-proof fence will be 450 kilometres long becoming the longest conservation fence in Africa.





The 10th Annual Aberdare Fence Relay Run was flagged off on 24th August 2022, by Mr. Jimmy Nyamu, Executive Director at the Elephant Neighbors Centre in a colourful ceremony held at Fence Commissioning site in the Aberdare National Park.

This year's event was supported by the European Union, the Organisation of African, Caribbean and Pacific States (ACP) through the BIOPAMA Programme under the theme, "Aberdare Ecosystem Our Livelihood."

The Aberdare Fence Relay Run was conceived in anticipation of the completion of the 400km Aberdare Electric Fence. The purpose of the run is to have all the schools that neighbour the Aberdare Fence take part in a relay race around the Aberdare ecosystem.

Participating schools are selected through an environmental essay writing competition, organised jointly by Rhino Ark and Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS). Approximately 600 children from 100 schools participate in the Run.

Each school in turn receives the Run Baton and runs several kilometres along a section of the Aberdare fence line fence to hand over the baton to the next participating school.

The Run aims to raise awareness among young people living around the Aberdare ecosystem of the importance of conserving this critical water tower, which provides

most of the drinking water for Nairobi and population centres located around the Aberdare ecosystem.

Speaking during the flag off, Mr. Jimmy Nyamu said, "I recognise the importance of the Aberdare ecosystem as a Water Tower and the need to protect it. Protecting the ecosystem is part of Climate Change mitigation. I am glad that the younger generation is involved in conservation work, thanks to Rhino Ark. It will help sensitise the community on the critical needs to conserve the Aberdares."

The Aberdare Fence Relay Run concluded on the 13th of October at a further event also presided by Mr. Jimmy Nyamu.

The event brought together primary schools drawn from the five counties that surround the Aberdare Ecosystem; Murang'a, Nyeri, Nyandarua, Kiambu and Laikipia. The relay baton has travelled 400km covering the entire perimeter of the Aberdare Electric Fence.

It was also an opportunity to award winners in the Aberdare Fence Essay Competition 2022 edition. They were awarded certificates and presented with gift vouchers. The Grand Prize went to Kahiga-ini Primary School for producing the "Best Overall Winner" in the pupils category, with a fully sponsored trip to the Aberdare National Park courtesy of BIOPAMA, Rhino Ark and the Kenya Wildlife Service.

10KM SECTION FENCING

The Aberdare fence construction stopped at the cliff section that stretches from Gitobu in Shamata to Rayetta in Wanjohi, leaving a gap of 10km unfenced.

The cliff has been effective in containing wildlife within the protected area, but recently, illegal cedar loggers have found a

corridor to illegally extract timber and burn charcoal, endangering remnants of cedar trees within River Malewa catchment.

The new project under the Darwin Initiative will help build 10km of fence to close the existing gap.

ABERDARES FOREST RESTORATION UNDER DARWIN INITIATIVE

Rhino Ark has undertaken the task of mapping a tree planting site that will be replanted under the Darwin Initiative. A total of 20 hectares were mapped out at Sophia, Geta Forest Station, in Nyandarua County.

ABERDARE JOINT SURVEILLANCE UNIT MANDATE

The Aberdare Joint Surveillance Unit (AJSU) is a partnership between Rhino Ark and the Kenya Wildlife Service. The AJSU, which was founded in 2010, is a novel concept where the local community is more actively involved in conservation efforts. The Unit is tasked with:

- Patrolling the forest and the 400km fence;
- Curbing illegal activities that threaten forest integrity;
- De-snaring traps set by poachers;
- Monitoring tree degeneration;
- Involving neighbouring communities in conservation work.

WHITECAP, RHINO CHARGE CAR 19 VISIT ABERDARE FENCE PROJECT

Rhino Charge Team 19 (Bushbabes), led by their Captain Petra Somen and a team from WhiteCap visited the Aberdare fence line. The aim of the visit was to assess the status of the solar power system adopted by Rhino Ark in mitigating human-wildlife conflict.

With funding support from WhiteCap through Car 19, Rhino Ark has been able to undertake some of its programmes in the water towers where it operates. Cumulatively, Rhino Ark has received slightly over KES 2 million from WhiteCap that has been channelled to conservation work.

Rhino Ark conservation projects funding is principally financed by the generosity of our donors, partners and sponsors. Through their support, we are able to pursue our core mission in assisting the Government of Kenya in conserving Kenya's Water Towers through the development and transparent implementation of effective, result-oriented programmes that involve and support the adjacent local communities, within a public-private partnership framework.

Rhino Ark is immensely grateful to the individuals and organisations who share our vision, and who donate their time, resources and funds to help translate our vision into a reality.

KAKAMEGA FOREST ECOSYSTEM


FENCING KAKAMEGA FOREST

The campaign to begin fencing off Kakamega Forest has begun. The project aims to prevent human encroachment on the forest.

The National Environment Trust Fund (NetFund), United Nations Development Programme, Kenya Forest Service, Rhino Ark Kenya and the Kenya Wildlife Service are partnering with the Kakamega and Vihiga county governments to erect the fence.

The Environmental Social Impact Assessment (ESIA) report commissioned by Rhino Ark indicated that the forest is on the verge of extinction if human activities continue unabated, such as grazing livestock and logging.

The ESIA report stated that demand for land due to a growing population was a threat to the forest, and that a proportion of the forest had already been turned into farmland.



KAKAMEGA FENCE PROJECT STAKEHOLDERS MEETING

Rhino Ark and its partners convened a workshop for leaders from communities bordering the Kakamega Forest, in Western Kenya. The workshop formed part of the electric fence construction preparatory process and was attended by more than 40 leaders of the area discussed key aspects of the fence, including:

- Alignment, design, construction and management of the project;
- Importance of community participation.

The workshop will be followed by community meetings in each of the locations where phase 1 of the fence will be sited.



KAKAMEGA FOREST FENCING PROJECT RECEIVES FURTHER FUNDING

Funding has been secured from UNDP (KES 72 million) and NETFund (KES 10 million) in support of the fencing and conservation of Kakamega Forest. In addition, the County Governments of Kakamega and Vihiga reiterated their commitment of KES 100M and KES 30M respectively, towards the project.

This follows the undertaking of the Environmental and Social Impact Assessment study for the fencing of Kakamega Forest, financed by Rhino Ark. A NEMA licence was issued after the successful submission of the study report.

Rhino Ark and its partners met in Kisumu on 21 June 2022, to agree on the various phases of the project and the implementation modalities. They also met with the leadership teams of both Kakamega and Vihiga counties, including the County Commissioners.




